

#### Tom Geogeghan's Straight Talking Congressional Bid

Interview by Cliff Carlson

Tom is a graduate of Harvard University and Harvard Law School. He has represented the United Mine Workers, Teamsters for a Demo-

cratic Union, and currently works at Despres, Schwartz and Geoghegan. He has been a staff writer and contributing writer to The New Republic and his work has also appeared in the Chicago Tribune, the Los Angeles Times, the New York Times, Dissent, The American Prospect, and The Nation. His commentary has been featured on National Public Radio, Nightline, The Today Show, CBS Sunday Morning, CNN, CNBC, and PBS's WTTW-11.

Geoghegan has announced he is running for Rahm Emanuel's seat in Illinois's 5th congressional district special election, 2009.[1] The primary for the special election will take place on March 3, 2009 and the general election on April 7, 2009. His name rhymes with Reagan

Why are you running?

"I'm running for Congress because of the economic meltdown. I'm a long-time, 30 year

and plant closings and layoffs. We have never  $had \,more\,of\,those.\,So\,I\,am\,going\,to\,Congress\,to$ bring my law practice into the public realm.

I want to argue for a higher social security

payout. You know the U.S. pays about 39% of working income, the OECD developed country average is 65%. I think we can move higher towards that goal.

Second, I want to put in place single payer national health because it's not only the right and ethical thing to do, but it is vastly more efficient, We can cut the medical bills by 30% because of the overhead we have with insurance companies, and use that money to raise peoples pensions instead.

The third reason I'm running is because I am a labor lawyer. It's time America had a pay raise. The hourly median wage in this country adjusted for inflation is exactly the same as it was in 1972. While output per hour productivity has gone up 75%. Its time the country had a wage increase.

I'm running on a platform of economic security, taking non-wage labor costs away from private employershavingthefederalgovernmentassume

intensive part of our economy, and because that way, through economic security, through government taking these non-wage labor costs, paying out decent pensions and health care from the government, that way our industry can be more competitive globally, that's why I'm running.

You would have the banks charge manufacturing less interest?

You've got to change the way investment is allocated in this country, until we put caps on the financial firms, not just the banks but the investment firms, until we bring back the usury laws in effect that used to exist from the time of the code of Hammurabi in Mesopotamia up to the Reagan era, until we do that we are going to have these huge inflated returns to banks and the financial sector, 35% interest on some credit cards now, 2000% interest on payday loans while our manufacturing returns 4 or 5% in terms of profit, well, the investment is going to end up going into the financial sector, bloating the financial sector, sucking the capitol out of the real economy. We have to change the pattern of investment in this country by making banks behave ethically, by putting interest caps on the banks and by insuring that the returns to the manufacturing sector are such that we have investment going into GM and Chrysler and machine tool industries rather than into banks and financial firms.

When were banks allowed to raise rates on credit cards?

Ihave clients that come in here that have taken out a \$1,700 dollar loan they paid back \$3,000 and they still haven't paid back the principal. How did that happen. It began in the 1960's there were exemptions in some state laws that said banks that had especially good moral character could have exemptions from the interest rate caps, but theywere rare occasions - household finance and so forth. Then in the 1970's there was a decision by the Supreme Court called Bank of Omaha vs Marquette Bank, and that decision which was handed down, even by the liberal, wonderful, Irish American Justice William Brennan, said that the national banking act preempted all state laws regulating usury. So that the National Banking Act which had no interest rate cap and which applied only to a handful of banks, but banks that were issuing visa's and mastercards could charge anything they like, and because of that decision the damn burst. If banks are coming in from out of state and issuing credit cards to people in Nebraska or Illinois or anywhere else and there are no caps on them, soon everybody is going to be doing the same thing. And that was the last finger in the dike against this huge avalanche of credit cards at usurious rates in this country. It was a symbolic, almost like a brown vs the board ofeducationSupremeCourtdecisionthatopened up the floodgates of the financial sector.

How do we get the Unions back into a good light in America?

Ithink most unions are really quite honest and decent institutions. No doubt there are bad actors. In my own career as a lawyer I have represented groups like Teamsters for a Democratic Union, and other groups that have fought union corruption, and I have testified to Congress about it. I am

certainly as part of my commitment as a union side labor lawyer is a commitmenttofightunioncorruptionbecause I want to present the best possible institutional framework for working people to have a stake as to what happens in this economy. We can't do that without honest and Democratic Unions. One of the things that I argued for in a book I wrote called "Which Side Are You On, Trying to be for Labor When it's Flat on it's Back? It was named by the national Book Critics Circle as one of the best nonfiction books in 1991 was very strongly for rank and file elections, and union Democracy, and I detailed some of the run ins I had with corrupt Union officers. But, I want to emphasise, I've spent my life fighting union corruption, but it's overblown compared to the reality of it is most union officers are practically apostle-ites. This is there way of serving other people. Most of these people, very talented, could be in a different line of work and making a lot more money.

How would you help us keep jobs here?

It's not so much keeping jobs here, as making sure that we keep investing in good manufacturing jobs. I'm not against globalization or trade, what I'm against is the way in which investment is rigged up in this country so that we disinvest from manufacturing, we disinvest from the real economy, and we over invest in the financial sector, and we over invest in gambling and speculation whether it's from casinos down in Indiana Harbor up to the Chicago Merc. There is too much gambling going on in the U.S., and it's gambling by the banks! That's why they

got into trouble. Peoples private pensions have collapsed because there all tied up in the stock. Remember when Bush wanted to have the whole Social Security system in the stock market. That was one of the things I fought against. I wrote articles about this, I appeared in Slate Magazine, and in USA Today, and the Chicago Tribune arguing against the Bush plan. What a disaster that would have been! I now believe that the most important priority for federal spending is to put money into Social Security, not just to preserve it, but actually to raise it, so that people have some alternative to the private pension system which has collapsed, and some alternative to pulling equity out of their houses, the value of which has collapsed.

Who are you running against, and how do you propose to stand

I think there are eleven people running. I'm the only candidate arguing for economic justice. I'm the only labor lawyer candidate, I'm the only candidate who has a message of economic security for working people.

How many books have you written?

I've written four books. I think there should be a limit on the number of books a person can write in a lifetime, but I've exceeded that, I really am arguing in different ways for the same thing in all the books which is providing economic security to working people. To provide a fair decent society in which everyone has a stake in what happens. I'm from the Democratic wing of the Democratic Party to use the famous expression about Paul Wellstone.

There is a lot of perceived and probably real corruption in government here in Chicago. What do you think you can do to change that image?

I think that my trying to run in this election on a platform as a Democrat I'm saying things Democrats don't normally say, very bluntly, aboutchangingtheeconomicmodel of this country in a way that helps working people is a way of changing the image of Illinois. It's important that I win this election, not because of any merits on my part or any reason why I, in particular, ought to be in Congress or even for any specific thing I could do once I'm down in Congress, but to show other Democrats that by articulating this message of economic security, increasing social security payout, bringing in single payer, putting interest rate caps on the banks in a way that no other Democrat in this race is talking about. That people will respond to that message and the party can run on that message, and that Barack Obama and his administration can carry out the reframing of the debate in this country with that message. That's why it's important that I get support for this candidacy. Every politician says 'It's not me, it's something bigger than me, and in the case of Barack Obama it is certainly true. He brought about a certain emphatic statement about theopenness of our society. But, now it's important to get across a different message which is that the country has to be fair to the people that work here. It's not fair and I want to change that. I want to make a job worth something to people.

What are the names of your four books?

I like them all. They are like my children. The first is Which Side Are You On?: Trying to Be For Labor When It's Flat On Its Back Published in 1991. Republished in 2005 with a long afterword, bringing up to date what's happened in the labor movement. The second is The Secret Lives of Citizens: Pursuing the Promise of American Life which argues what I think is wrong with the constitution of the United States, but told I hope in a charming, anecdotal street level way which got very good reviews. The third is In America's Court: How a Civil Lawyer Who Likes to Settle Stumbled into a Criminal Trial. It is a narrative description of what it was like for me to go down and try a criminal case at 26th and California. The last one is called See You in Court: How the Right Made America a Lawsuit Nation. "It's a more polemical argument as to why the Philo Powers and the Neocons are wrong. It's not the liberals who created all the litigation it's the conservatives who created it by deregulating everything. Increasing interest rates. There are probably, I would guess, 200,000 creditor/debtor cases pending in the Circuit Court of Cook County – that's one county in the United States - all because of the change in the interest rate caps and in deregulation of the country. It's led to more, not less litigation, and I've tried to get that point across to people. I thinkit's a pretty interesting argument. Buy the book. More importantly, I hope I get peoples votes in this election. (Tom's book can be found soon at www.theirishbookclub.com).

# Sinn Fein President Gerry Adams Praises U.S. During Recent Visit By Maureen Callahan

Despite the aid and assistance this great nation has offered others for so long, it seems of late that the utterance of our country's name does not always trigger a tsunami of warm sentiments abroad. It was nice to hear a change of pace in this respect. The gratitude and compliments flowed as freely and steadily as draught Guinness on a warm evening last autumn in San Francisco. The historic Sir Francis Drake Hotel set a festive backdrop for a Sinn Fein fundraiser complete with President Gerry Adams as the keynote speaker.

Sinn Fein is the left-winged Irish Republican Army political party. The current party was founded in 1970, although it is decendent of a party of the same name which dates back originally to 1905. The actual party name translates into English as "ourselves," or "we ourselves." The fundraiser was a meet-and-greet of sorts, held to stoke American interest in the party's political cause. It was the second event of the day presided over by Gerry Adams. Earlier that afternoon, he had dedicated the firstever Gaelic football and hurling field in the San Francisco Bay Area, located in Treasure Island. While there, he took some decided whacks with a hurling stick at a few unsuspecting balls. "You know, hurling is the world's fastest field game," Adams commented to the gathered crowd, working the stick with obvious skill. Primarily in town to inform the local Irish American community of the latest political news and current list of snarls the northern Irish community faces, he clearly enjoyed the hurling much more than the hands haking thatfollowed that evening.

Windows open on that warm autumn evening, a packed ballroom waited in anticipation against the faint sound of the Union Square cable car bell ringing on the street below. It was easy to see that night how Gerry Adams, Sinn Fein's president of 25 years, has earned a reputation of being a good communicator and negotiator. While his presence as the leader of Ireland's oldest political movement commands a certain level of respect in itself, his humor and humble manner does much to sell his message as well. Wading through a sold-out crowd in a generally spacious hall, he politely excused himself to those he bumped into on the way to the stage, shaking hands with a fortunate few on his forged path.

"Strength. Sovereignty. Equality. These are the pillars necessary to pave the way to peace in Northern Ireland, Adams professed. Sinn Fein is the only party who vote toward



these ideals continually. We need to be a united, well-informed front and be able to keep the channels of communications open in order to make good decisions. These decisions will affect us as a party, as a presence on the world political landscape and as the voice of hope for one free, united Ireland. Such decisions will be far reaching and difficult. The most important element required will be courage. But you have never lacked courage in the past. Your courage is now needed for the future. Our struggle depends on international support. The Irish are indebted to The United States. We thankfully recognize the contributions of this great American nation, beginning with the Clintonadministrationand carried on throughout the Bush administration. Before these leaders, each move was much more a matter of terrorism. Progress has been slow but steady. I amproud of the recent reign of peace. This nation is a true beacon of hope to our world. Northern Ireland appreciates the efforts of the American people, and fosters much gratitude toward them."

Among other themes, Adams went on to stress the importance of the evolution of the peacekeeping process—the establishment of a new Ireland as a sovereign state; true democracy, equality and justice at all levels of economics and society, as well as a lasting and meaningful peace. He spent a few minutes on question and answer before thanking the crowd profusely for coming out that evening. With the graciousness of a true gentleman, he bowed before the hundreds gathered before exiting the stage. Turning to a line of people patiently waiting to take pictures with him, he took a few moments

with each person, seeming genuinely interested in each one's comments.

Iwasfortunate enough to get a few moments of his time after the address, which I greatly appreciated, since it was evident how exhausted he was. The first question I asked was one I had always wondered.

MC: "It must be difficult for you if other members (of the IRA) do not agree with you and continue to set off bombs somewhere across town

while you are signing your name to a cease-fire agreement, not knowing whether or not you will be able to honor it."

GA: "Yes, that was very difficult, butinorder to keep our efforts moving forward, I must think and hope that this is an occurrence of the past. We have been fortunate with being able to keep peace in the North for almost a decade now, and I am happy with this trend. It was never easy for me to be the person signing on the bottom line, but it has been better of late."

MC: "What do you think is the most difficult part of your position as President of Sinn Fein?"


GA: "Truly one of the most difficult aspects of my job as Sinn Fein President is to be sure that I have the right people keeping a watchful eye over the party and helping to keep the party united. Above all, we must be united before we can be anything else."

MC: "How terrible was it to be locked away on The Maidstone (a British prison ship) in the 1970s after being arrested and imprisoned without trial for peacefully protesting the Bloody Sunday massacres?"

GA: "Well, what do you think? Yes, it was terrible. Four years spent serving unjustly on a prison ship infamous for overcrowding and brutality were not the best time of years of my life. But it's in the past now. We go forward, not backward."



I saw tears and cheers and felt very positive in the reaction of the Irish who were there with us.


Thank you again Rosie and Tom for including us at your event, we did feel very much at home.

#### Chicago Irish Project

cago Irish Immigrant Support Center, a non-profit organization dedicated to serving Irish immigrants in Chicago, joined forces with Wellspring Personal Care, a Chicago based private duty home care agency to create The Chicago Irish Project. In the first phase of the project, the organizations developed "An Café Liteartha" (Literary Café), a Drop-In Gathering for Older ment and funding was awarded Adults that provides a forum to gather and express an affinity for all things Irish. The twice monthly meetings feature guest speakers, educational programs, lively group discussion, Irish films, traditional Irish music and food. While the most visible in the Café's participant group still have strong social ties, the concern began to grow for the frail elderly who may have limited mobility, or who may have simply lost their social connections.

The second phase of the project, now underway, focuses on reaching out to this group of Irish elderly. As a field placement training site for Irish social work students for the past eight ages informal conversations

years, Wellspring Personal Care trains students from the University College Cork and National In the fall of 2007, the Chi- University of Ireland, Galway. By incorporating the learning experiences available through the "Chicago Irish Project" into the total field placement opportunity, the Project hopes to attract students who may have a long term interest in the working with older adults in Ireland. In 2008, The Chicago Irish Project was recognized by the Irish Abroad Unit of the Irish governto Chicago Irish Immigrant Support to underwrite the continuation of student involvement. Additionally, the Irish government is encouraging Irish Immigrant Support organizations around the country to replicate the Project's design.

What has been most impressive and an unanticipated benefit of this program has been the story sharing between our Irish students, whose generation matured during a period of unprecedentedeconomicgrowth and prosperity, and the Chicago Irish Project's older adults whose memories are of a very different Ireland. The environment at "An Café Liteartha" encour-

where there is an opportunity for older adults to openly share stories about the challenges they faced as new immigrants in the mid 20th century. Although the students have some awareness of the economic hardships that many of their grandparents experienced, interaction with these unrelated older adults serves to bridge the communication gap about the past that often exists within families.

In 2009, the Chicago Irish Project, through its incoming social work students, will focus on developing outreach and innovative programming for Irish born older adults who may be isolated or alone, and whenever possible, bringing them back into mainstream Irish life.

#### Chicago Mourns Loss of Mel Loftus

man recently: Mel Loftus, of Chicago. Mel went to high school at Kelvyn Park where he played football and was part of the 1943 championship team. He met his future wife, Rita, at elected president. Kelvyn Park from some friends, not knowing they would be sharing over 50 joyous years together. At the break out of WW II, Mel, like many others enlisted in what was then the Army Air Corps, where he hoped to eventually become a pilot. The waiting list was too long, so he was assigned as a tail gunner with a B-17 unit in the 398th bomber group out of Northhampsted, England. The average casualty rate for a B-17 crew was 30% on a mission over Germany. Mel and his crew who still meet annually survived 28 missions. Mel earned a purple heart and was also awarded the Air Medal with five Oak clusters for his service over Europe.

Shortly after the war, Mel reconnected and married his wife of 53 years, Rita. After several different careers including a surveyor, Mel heard the pipes calling and decided his future would be in plumbing. His career began as an apprentice and he later became a Recording Secretary of the Chicago Plumbers Union, Local 130.

Mel was the guy who never said no when you needed help. Neighbors often called him when they had plumbing issues and regardless of the time, he gladly took care of those who needed help. At one time when a neighbor had a heart attack, he organized a group of local men to finish the man's home which was in the middle of construction.

Mel's wife Rita suffered a stroke during her second pregnancy, continued to have a child while she was in a coma and amazingly, they had four more children after. Mel did his best and raised six children with Rita in their North Side home in Edgebrook.

His passions were parades and Las Vegas and golf. Mel began participating in the St. Patrick's parades in 1962 and continued for the next 40 years—being honored as the St. Patrick's Parade Marshall in 1995, and also honored as "Man of the Year" by the Emerald Society. Mel also served as President of the

Irish Americans lost a great Shannon Rovers who he enjoyed immensely and brought them to many city and political events. Mel also was part of the team who organized the torch light parade for JFK the year he was

> He had a great work ethic and was always trying to improve

his life. He sold real estate, played the accordion and, of course, worked hard to represent organized labor. He loved to entertain. Mel was known for his monologueandcomedysessions which always had you at the edge of your seat and wondering if he would say one of his politically incorrect jokes. He roasted many of friends with his witty humor. all who knew him.

He was a hard working, loyal, feisty and passionate man who believed in helping others and did his best to make this a better place for others—whether helping someone find work, telling jokes, organizing a parade, helping a neighbor or taking care of his family as best he could.

# Irish Books and Plays in Review





#### Irish Literature for 2009

The Gestapo quickly surrounded the large house in Rome. They had a watch on the house, and the Irish priest that they badly wanted to capture had been seen entering. His name was Father Hugh O'Flaherty, and they knew he helped Allied soldiers, airmen, POW's, Jews and anti-Fascists. This was during World War II and the Gestapo believed they were finally going to capture him.

When he heard the Gestapotrucks pulling up, he knew what had happened. There was no building close enough to escape to. He fled to the basement—and there saw a streak of sunlight! He realized the coal chute was open, and that coal was being delivered.

The Gestapo police let the two men delivering the coal continue. When one came inside, O'Flaherty asked him to stay in the basement. He smeared coal dust on himself and, stoopedoverandlookingshabby with an empty coal sack on his shoulder, went out. He walked slowly, so as not to alert the police, and had the presence of mind to nod to the Gestapo police, and walked away.



I want the review to show the reader the suspense and excitement lived by this person. Father O'Flaherty was a real life hero—not a fictional character.

Pimpernel, in the book's title, comes from a 1905 novel about fictional British aristocrats during the French Revolution, and their wouldbe exploits of espionage.

O'Flaherty was an Irish priest working in the Vatican. He worked at his official job, but also made time to help thousands of people hunted, first by the Italian Fascists, and then by the German Gestapo.

One of those he helped evade torture and death was a British officer who said: "Rarely has a man owed his life to such strange factors as a scholarly monsignor, with the (excessive?) brain of a business tycoon; a giant priest, with the strength of a lion and the gentleness of a lamb..."

O'Flaherty was planning to go to a rural location to bring back a sick soldier. Talk about the luck of the Irish! "O'Flaherty was in his room with a couple of his helpers. They were celebrating St. Patrick's Day when the phone rang, and after listening for a few moments... he was heard to say 'alright I understand... God forgive him." The call was a tip-off that a helper had informed on him and he was to be captured.

A woman who had worked with him during those years of fear and terror in Rome said of him: "He was a gentle, gentle man, he really was... a very clever and a very lovable man... a great, great man."

Hugh O'Flaherty was a man with a big heart filled with compassion for people.


These are some things I think will interest the reader.

- A diary entry of a person in Rome for May 8, 1944: "A real event took place today: we each had our monthly ration of 3 1/2 oz. of meat for dinner."
- Also in that diary for May, 1944 is the mention that the official ration of bread was about two slices a day.
- O'Flaherty formed room in his heart for sympathy for the former SS chief of Rome, Lieutenant Colonel Herbert Kappler. He'd received a life sentence for the reprisal killings he had ordered.

The Italian prison allowed him visitors only once a month. The only person who visited this odious person was Fr. O'Flaherty. He visited him once a month, and wrote to him for all the years he remained in Rome. What compassion and kindness!


O'Connell was able to get the Irish people to see a future where they would have political rights, dignity and equality. They would have full voting rights, could hold positions in Ireland's government, and could join professions. All of these were denied to Catholics by the British government.

O'Connell's great triumph was to show the Irish people that if they would act as one, they could end the Penal Laws. Catholic Emancipation resulted in 1829.

- Why isn't a picture included of this great man? He was a handsome, well-built, blue-eyed Irish man. Why is there only a black silhouette of him?
- The Irish masses adored him, and the British rulers realized this was a great threat to their power. They tried to buy him off with a job. "... they asked me what I wished to have alone for myself. Like a true Irishman, Ianswered their question... by asking them another. 'Tell me, said I, what are you going to do for Ireland?""

### Calling All Kellys

By Mike Houlihan

Honora Kelly would be proud. She's the great, great grandmother of novelist Mary Pat Kelly, who hits Chicago next month with her new book, Galway Bay.

Most Irish Americans of a certain age owe their very existence to their ancestors and their escape from the Great Starvation. A million people starved to death in Ireland between 1846 and 1851. Almost two million emigrated from Ireland to America.

Mary Pat Kelly says, "It's one of the greatest rescues in human history. And the Chelsea and had the landlady slam the door in victims saved themselves. They reached back, one reaching back for the next."

Many of them came to Chicago, like Mary Pat's ancestor Honora Kelly. Her story and the story of her descendents is the root of Kelly's magnificent Irish novel Galway Bay.

She wrote the book because "I kept being haunted by The Famine. I don't think contemporary Irish American people understand just how horrific this thing was. How the deck was stacked against them on every level."

Oxford at the time, wrote that the Famine'would not kill more than one million people, and that 0D would scarcely be enough to do any good."

"So that was the attitude. In some ways they drove the English crazy."

In Galway Bay, Honora Kelly says, "We wouldn't die, and that annoyed them."

Mary Pat tells me, "I wanted to write about the survivors and who they were. I wanted to write about the courage it took to get out. I wanted to tell this Irish story about these strong women. And as you do your genealogy you start to see history in a different way because you realize that some one you descended from, lived through that. You also become very grateful to them for surviving."

Galway Bay may be the story of the Kelly Clan but it's also all of our stories.


It's a story that Mary Pat Kelly has been working on for over 40 years. When she was in sixth grade her family settled in Sauganash, Queen of All Saints parish. When she graduated from high school this gorgeous Irish colleen entered the Sisters of Providence Convent.

Five years studying at St. Mary of the Woods and Sister Maura Michael took her

temporary vows and was assigned to teaching at Providence High School on the west side of Chicago. It was the late sixties in the ghetto and Sister witnessed the birth of the civil rights movement. She joined right in.

"It was turbulent times but it was a fabulous experience for me. The kids were incredible. It was a huge eye opener for me. The nuns and the people at Our Lady of Sorrows, there was a lot of really good work going on in the community. It was fantastic."

It was the beginning of a life long commit-



ment to social justice.

Mary Pat left the convent. She says with a laugh, "It was kind of a mutual decision, shall we say."

Shecontinuedworking on the west side for the Poverty Program in Lawndale. "And then Nixon was elected and it just wasn't the same."

In 1969, she and her pal, Mary Beth McDonough, went to Europe. They tried to rent an apartment in

their faces when they told her their Irish names.

One night they hopped a cheap flight to Dublin to see Peter O'Toole onstage in Waiting For Godot. She got flustered giving change to a conductor and he finally said, "Would you ever relax? You're home!"

Mary Pat says, "And that was it. We drove into Dublin and I started to see the names and the next morning the faces, and I said, 'This is the ten o'clock mass at Oueen of All Saints!"

All the faces and the names were familiar. "Nassau Senior, an economics professor at Mary Pat was home and fell in love with the country of herancestors. Herinsatiable appetite for Irish knowledge led her to investigate the history of the Kelly family and how they came to America, to Chicago, to Bridgeport!

She's traveled back and forth to the old country over the years and along the way established a career as screenwriter, novelist, and producer. She's written two books on her friend, film director Martin Scorsese. They met when she wrote him a letter from the convent while studying young filmmakers. They're still pals.

But always there was the spirit of Honora Kelly. Mary Pat may no longer be a member of the Sisters of Providence but providence found a way back into her life with the story of her

> great, great grandmother in Galway Bay. It's a love story of romance, courage, and humor.

"I have such admiration for all of our ancestors and I think it's a good time to remember that we come from very strong people."

Galway Bay will be available everywhere February 9th. Mary Pat Kelly will be all over Chicago in March. She's calling all Kelly's to join the rest of the clan on March 7th at Calvary cemetery to honor Honora Kelly.

"Afterwards we're going to have a reception at the Polo Café in Bridgeport."

On the wall of the Mayor's Suite in the Polo Café hangs a picture of the late mayor of Chicago, Edward Joseph Kelly, the first of five mayors from Bridgeport. Mayor Kelly was another of the descendants of Honora Kelly from Galway Bay.

I was particularly moved by a lovely ballad, written by Ron Kavana, about the Irish fighting the fascists in the Span-

ish Civil War. "Maria de la Rosa" tells of the sacrifice of Irish soldiers and the heritage they left behind. The entire album consists of one beautifully rendered song after another, not a clinker in the bunch. A CD that's wonderful to listen to and you learn something to boot. It was certainly worth a trip through the snow to get these CDs, Thanks Máirtín!



The only "moon" in this production was provided by another guy we know: Frank McCourt's brother, Malachy, who makes a brief appearance as a character that has lately become a stock low-life Hollywood villain—the Catholic priest. (You

may recall that Dennehy also played a priest, Father Spagnoli, in the 2005 Hollywood dramatization of the priestly abuse scandal in Boston.)

Thankfully, Malachy's role as Father Connell" is brief. He appears in a confessional booth, so his face is in shadows. And he gets out only a few words in his unmistakable broque before the killer cop blasts him out of the box into the aisle, dead. This leads to the piece de resistance, the movie scene to cap an actor's career.

The killer rolls the fallen priest over and yanks down his trousers, in Scarecrow earlier that same year, exposing to the world his rosycheeked, smiling white bottom; and quickly places something midst that pale moon.

I doubt it. But then again...

I have mentioned before in this space the near total ban by American media on informing the public of the results of a lengthy investigation by Associated Press into widespread sexual predation by teachers and administrators in American public

schools. That three-part AP series was to have run nationwide in October 2007, but was carried by few outlets, and mostly in heavily edited versions

Unheralded in May of 2008, the **Education Writers Association met** in Chicago and duly awarded Martha Irvine and Robert Tanner of the Associated Press its Fred M. Hechinger Grand Prize for Distinguished Education Reporting for their Teacher Sex Abuse series. Accepting the award, Irvine proudly noted that day one of the series made the front page of 90 US papers. But with 1,422 daily newspapers and 6,253 weeklies in the US, that adds up to only 1.2% of all papers in the country.

It's curious that on Jan. 8 this year, MSNBC.com on its home page carried a news link: "Sex misconduct plaguing schools," which led to the original part one of the 2007 series, including the old dateline. 

Leave People to Grieve —And by the way, Stop Killing.

## Celtic Kitchen -Pure and Simple

#### The Great Sea Bounty of West Coast Ireland

or Irish Sea salmon to start their culinary adventure in Irish seafood, one look to (or random suggestion for) the west coast will have the traveler changing their plans. Classic fishing ports dotted along the coasts beginning around Co. Cork and winding up to Galway Bay will lend themselves to charm, stories, and some of the best seafood ever. Add a bit of history to the pot and stir, and the experience of the Irish seafood plate is complete.

While I was at school, Darina Allen encouraged the students to visit Ballycotton Harbour near Ballymaloe. It was at the docks that we watched the fishermen bring in their loads of

While many look to Dublin prawns seasonal fish. Certain times of the vear lent itself to better fishing. Winter was meant for sole, turbot, and John Dory fish, while the spring held bounties of shrimp, crab and even lobster. Preparing these wonderful products was, for me, a privilege. Seafood all over the world is expensive. Ballymaloe allowed us to see the fish fresh, skin it, bone it, and prepare it in such a way that complemented the flavor and texture, without turning it into an unrecognizable ingredient. So now walking among the seafood counters at the store, I am not afraid.

> Anyway, during the autumn 'bank holiday' weekend, a couple of us students toured the coast and found our

way to Kinsale, Co. Cork. This was a wonderful stop along the southern route heading towards the Dingle Peninsula. Kinsale is noted for boating, sea angling, and food festivals. (In 1601, Spanish/Irish forces were defeated here by British troops. The Spanish influence will be important later.) For us travelling students the town was so full of character, not to mention great restaurants; we were impressed just walking through town and tried to get a table at the Blue Haven overlooking the harbor. After about an hour at the barsipping wine, we were seated in the restaurant. I was constantly looking for the best smoked salmon (which I found from Hederman's in Cork), so I had poached salmon, while Lucy had a plate of the largest prawns I'd ever seen. She only lightly dipped them in melted Irish butter and had to declare them the best. Simply prepared, she sketched her guess of the recipe and vowed to try them back at school.

We wound around the Irish coastal corner and headed to Dingle. I'd been there a couple times and back then we went out to Skellig Michael on the way. It is quite a sight, but not a place or boat ride for landlubbers. Avoiding the boat rides and enjoying the sea air this time, we stopped along

the shores for only tea and a snack. Our goal was for Galway.

Galway is the epicenter of vibrant culture in Ireland. They have festivals throughout the year, numerous parades, and music events. When it comes to food, the main event is the Galway Oyster Festival. This event began in 1954 by a local hotel owner and is now one of the longest festivals running. It happens every September (so we had missed it by that time), and lasts only one weekend. Pair a creamy Guinness and a platter of fresh oysters, and there is nothing better!

Historically speaking, Galway has a bit of Spanish blood. There was a complicated history with Spain beginning in the early 1600's. Basically, Spain and Ireland were working together after signing treaties to fight off Cromwell. Unfortunately, they were not successful. However, even after the loss, some of the Spanish soldiers found the Irish lasses in Galway worth leaving Spain behind. They settled on the coast, influencing architecture as seen in the Spanish Arch and Spanish Parade. Also Spanish influenced was the local cuisine, with their use of more spices and seasonings. My cod stew with chorizo, leeks and potatoes reflects

the great heritage of Irish seafood and produce while combing it with a 'recent'influence of Spanish chorizo, a Spanish smoked sausage.

The wealth of Irish seafood is spread country wide. The west coast has such a plethora of choices, flavors and influences, one cannot say that they've had a taste and think they know the dish while another version waits over in the next town. What an adventure!


Cod Stew with Chorizo, Leeks, and Potatoes 1 large leek, sliced into 1/2 in. rounds juice. Slowly boil for 15 minutes. Add

and soaked in water to remove grit 6 oz. chorizo, sliced into <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> in. rounds

- 1 T. olive oil
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/2 t. dried thyme
- 128 oz. can whole peeled tomatoes, with juice
- 1/2 c. dry white wine
- 2 c. water Salt and pepper, to taste
- 1/4 c. chopped parsley
- 1 lb. cod, cut in four pieces French bread

Put potatoes in pot with salted, boiling water. Let cook until just tender, 7-10 minutes. Drain and put aside. In large soup pot, heat oil. Add sausage and cook for several minutes. Drain and add leeks. Cook until leeks are soft. Add garlic, stir 1 minute. Add wine, water, thyme, 1/2 t. salt, 1/4 t. pepper. Hand crush tomatoes over pot and add

Serves 4 1/2 parsley and potatoes and stir. Taste and adjust seasoning. Carefully lay cod on top of stew, partially cover with 1 lb. red potatoes, cut into 1/2 in. cubes lid and cook until fish is opaque, 6-8 minutes. Using spatula, pick up piece of fish and set aside. Ladle stew into bowls and lay fish on top. Sprinkle with remaining parsley. Serve with slices of French bread, brushed with olive oil and toasted under broiler. Brilliant!

born in Altmore, Co. Tyrone in 1806, Shields immigrated to the US in the mid-1820s. He settled in Illinois in 1829 and became first a teacher and then an attorney. He was an able lawyer but was mostly attracted to politics. He ran for political office and was elected to the Illinois House in 1836. He took his seat along with such other notable first timers as Abraham Lincoln and Stephen Douglas in the Legislature, Shields collaborated with and was a rival of Lincoln both in love and the law. Their rivalry was so intense that Shields and Lincoln met with military swords in hand to fight a duel to the death on the banks of the Mississippi in 1842. Fortunately for both men, the challenge was averted at the last moment and neither got hurt.

Shields, a fighter who did not suffer setbacks gladly, was not a shoo-in like Burris, who was seated subsequently without

much fuss. When Illinois Governor Augustus C. French called a special election to fill Shields' now-vacated position later in 1849, Shields again tossed his hat into the political ring. This time he satisfied the citizenship requirement but was a lot less popular—in part because of his political theatrics in trying to hold onto his seat the first time round. Nevertheless, following a tough electoral fight Shields again emerged victorious and was sworn in as junior senator from Illinois. That was not the end of the US Senate-Shields story. Shields subsequently became a US Senator representing two additional states. He was elected to the Senate from Minnesota in 1858 and appointed from Missouri in 1879, the year of his death. To this day, the Irishman is the only person to have represented three states in all. That was certainly political drama.

#### Irish Theater Lacking

Theater in Ireland is currently in bad shape according to a pessimistic 2008 year end review in the Irish Independent. There were no memorable productions and no seminal work appeared last year. The criticism was applied across the boards to theatrical institutions, actors and writers. "This was not a good year to be mining Irish theatre," said the newspaper, and concluded

that the theater stands "on shaky around."

"I spent much of the year at the theatre craving something new. Something to break through a fourth wall that had remained stubbornly standing. Something tosuggestthattherewerepeople out there looking for different ways to do things, aware that the way things have been done... looks increasingly threadbare," lamented the reporter.

The reporter suggested that Ireland's economic boom over the past decade (that has now become a bust) was largely to blame. The boom enabled the construction of "over ambitious arts centres" but did little for creativity since paradoxically better wages were "squeezing the lifeblood" out of creativity. The reporter noted that Irish writers are "coasting on (Ireland's) reputation for storytelling, and offering little of genuine innovation to the world." It is "time for our writers to pull on the fingerless gloves again and return to their draughty garrets to wrestle with the new stories emerging from an Ireland that has lost its confidence—and that may be a more conducive environment to making great theatre," the report exhorted. The writer speculated that a return to poorer times and a "dole culture" could have a silver lining—that it could lead to richer theatrical output. One can only hope.

#### Miss Saigon at Drury Lane Oakbrook

The classic love-story, Miss Saigon, will run through March 8 at Drury Lane Oakbrook, 100 Drury Lane in Oakbrook Ter-

Set in 1975 in the days before Saigon's fall to Communist forces at the end of the Vietnam War. Miss Saigon is the epic love-story of an American GI, Chris, and a young Vietnamese woman, Kim. Kim and Chris have a brief but passionate affair and he vows to take her out of Saigon.

On the evening of the largest helicopter evacuation in history, the two are separated and Chris is forced leave Vietnam without his love. Three years after the war's end the two struggle to deal with the emotional aftermath of their affair while moving on with new lives. Chris, now married, discovers that he has a young son with Kim, while Kim clings to the hope that she and Chris will be reunited and raise their son







#### An Immigrant's Musings

#### **CIR Enactment Begins**

With the beginning of the new Congress comes the encouraging news that the new administration is going to make a renewed effort to enact comprehensive immigration reform. This is indeed encouraging news for all who have been working on this issue for the past few years.

The 111th session of Congress introduced of 2009" Sen. Leahy, chairman of the Judiciary committee made the following remarks on the Senate floor when introducing the legislation (Sen. Kennedy resigned as chairman of the immigration subcommittee, thereby shifting immigration matters within the purview of Sen. Leahy.)

"Mr. President, as we begin the 111th Congress, we will try, once again, to enact comprehensive immigration reforms that have eluded us in the past several years. With an administration that understands the critical necessity of meaningful reform and that understands the policy failures of the last 8 years, I am hopeful that the new Congress can finally enact legislation consistent with our history as a nation of immigrants."

"The majority leader has included immigration reform as among the legislative priorities for the new Congress. I look forward to working with him, Senator Kennedy, Senator McCain, and others interested in working toward the goal of immigration reform. If our immigration policies are to be effective and play a role in restoring America's image around the world, we must reject the failed policies of the last 8 years. We cannot continue to deny asylum seekers because they have been forced at the point of a gun to provide assistance to those engaged in terrorist acts. We cannot continue to label as terrorist organizations those who have stood by the United States in armed conflict. We must not tolerate the tragic and needless death of a person in our custody for lack of basic medical care. We must ensure that children are not needlessly separated from their parents and thatfamily unity is respected."

"We must move beyond the current policy that is focused on detaining and deporting those undocumented workers who have been abused and exploited by American employers butdoesnothingtochangeanenvironmentthat remains ripe for these abuses. We must protect the rights and opportunities of American workers and, at the same time, ensure that our Nation's farmers and employers have the help they need. We should improve the opportunities and make more efficient the processes for those who seek to come to America with the goal of becoming new Americans, whether to invest in our communities and create jobs, to be reunited with loved ones, or to seek freedom and opportunity and a better life."

"We must also live up to the goal of family



reunification in our immigration policy and join at least 19 other nations that provide immigration equality to same-sex part-

ners of different nationalities. And I believe we would be wise to reconsider the effectiveness and cost of a wall along our southern border, which has adversely affected the fragile environment and vibrant cross-border culture of an entire region. Such a wall stands as a symbol of fear and intolerance. This is not what America is about and we can do better."

"Those who oppose a realistic solution to S. 9"Stronger Economy, Stronger Borders Act address the estimated millions of people currently living and working in the United States without proper documentation have offered no alternative solution other than harsh penalties and more enforcement. The policies of the last 8 years, which have served only to appease the most extreme ideologues, must be replaced with sensible solutions. I am confident that our country and our economy will be far more secure when those who are currently living in the shadows of our society are recognized and provided the means to become lawful residents, if not a path to citizenship."

> "As President-elect Obama's administration considers immigration issues, I look forward to working closely with them and with the Senate's leadership to find the best solutions. President-elect Obama's nominees to lead the Department of Homeland Security and the Department of Labor understand very well the importance of sensible border policies and the importance of workers' rights. The American people look to all of us to forge a consensus for immigration reform that rejects the extreme ideology that has attended this issue and prevented real progress."

> While we welcome this development, we are well aware that much work needs to be done to get this legislation passed. We urge all of our supporters to write, call, or e-mail your Representatives and Senators and express your support for immigration reform.



He made no mention of the 2016 target date. In fact he suggested that it could be possible in another 40 years!

Where is the outrage at the nerve of this guy? He calls himself a republican but the fact is that Mr. Adams and the rest of Provisional Sinn Fein have achieved NOTHING to move us closer to a 32 county Ireland. In fact, they have only helped to reinforce partition and secure the 6 counties' position as part of the UK.

In a 12 part series, this narrative examines some of the more obscure events in Irish history and the effect they had on the families of a small mountain in County Roscommon. It will also reveal the incredible chain of events that led to the discovery of these people as the winds of change delivered a blight upon their main source of food.

#### The Scattering of Sliabh Ban Part Three

Reduced to the level of indentured slaves. the Irish of the early 1800's were ill prepared to tackle the calamity that awaited them. A blight on their main food source would render the once hardy tenant farmers helpless and finally, hopeless. And history fails to mention that prior to the potato crop failure of 1845 there had been a failure 12 years earlier and another just 10 years before that.

The descendents of O'Manachain, the chieftains of Sliabh Ban and the Three Tuaths, are now peasant 'farmers-at-will' by a landlord system sustained after the Act for the Settlement of Ireland in 1652. The earlier 16th century Plantations of Ireland had decimated the Ui Neill Clan leading to the flight of the Earls. Unfortunately for the Irish, when they aligned themselves with the English Royalists (who were fighting the "Roundhead" supporters of the new Parliament) the Irish Catholics found themselves on the losing end of an English Civil war that would finally see Cromwell's Army soundly defeating the Irish, the Royalists, and dismantling the Catholic Confederation.

Sliabh Ban and 30,000 acres of land would be granted to the Mahon family by Charles II at the war's end. Ensuing generations would

build a manor and establish a tenancy that would provide a tax base for the English parliament.

Manor pic The Penal Laws, which were meant tomakethem poorandthen

keep them poor, did exactly that. Two hundred years after Cromwell and 50 years after 'unification' with England which has been called 'the greatest single bribe ever

perpetrated by the English Parliament', the 1800 Act in a single stroke removed an Irish Parliament which had been in existence for 500 years.

The first attempt at Union failed but the second attempt after massive numbers of peerages were awarded, the Irish Parliament voted for its own abolition. A major codicil in the agreement was the emancipation of the Catholics and the removal of the punitive laws restricting their every movement. But shortly after the Union, King George III rescinded the proclamation. His explanation was that official support of Popery in English Ireland would violate his oath to protect the Protestant faith. Ireland was now being ruled from London. One hundred MP's entered the House of Commons and 30 new 'peers' joined the House of Lords at Westminster. And with the addition of a diagonal 'St. Patrick's Cross' subordinate to the white St. Andrew's and the red St. George's, the Union Flag would become the same that we see today. And the "culchies" of the Irish countryside, astonished by the proclamation of Union, labeled the Dublin based parliament "Jackeens"... a derogatory name which still echoes in the quite country public houses today.

So the once proud Irish would continue to suffer the humiliation of ignorance, poverty, and subordination. Thirty years would pass

before the Daniel O'Connell would successfully argue the case for emancipation. Unfortunately, before any substantial gains were made by the landless farmers, a five year blightwoulddescenduponthemravagingany and all hope.

Among the tenant farmers was a young man, not yet 21 years old, and a young girl of 15. Their story would remain hidden for exactly 150 years before being uncovered after what can only be called a 'miraculous' series of serendipitous events.

A quick note: In 2002, after stumbling upon the novel 'because they never do,' the story of Michael and Mary, a small group of Chicago's Southside Irish convened the first meeting of The Scattering Project. The sole purpose was to get the story of Ireland's famine years made into a film. There has never been a film dedicated to





for the ballad tradition of the Makem & Spain Brothers and the good-natured irreverence of Gaelic Storm you will find The Kreellers. Exuberant and passionate, talented and unique, a Kreellers show is a rollicking party reminiscent of the Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem. Shout outs, singalongs and dancing in the aisles are the norm at a Kreellers show, so is a great joy in the ballad tradition.

Drums were never a part of CB & TM, tho' both Liam and Tommy played the Bodhran. Tommy played the war pipes and whistles too, and The Kreellers newest addition, bagpipe and whistles playing Larry Fortson, completes the package for one of the rising new stars on the Celtic music scene.

Starting as Bruno's Boys in 1998, brothers Derek Wade and Paul Bruno were raised on songs and stories, while trailing along side their dad as great area. A career in music wasn't planned, but when the door opened, they were more than ready to step on through.

Not a band for the faint of heart, tho'they have many beautiful songs in their repertoire, most Kreeller songs are marked by a driving beat. > The Kreellers are brothers Derek Wade (lead vocals, harmonica, mandolin, and bodhran) and Paul Bruno (guitar, bodhran and accordion), percussionist and backup vocals TK, and the aforementioned Larry Fortson on pipes and whistle.

> "We are absolutely Irish, said Derek. The Clancy Brothers, I remember seeing The Dubliners, taking it all in, loving it. As the Bruno Boys, we couldn't grab people the way we wanted to. We are still steeped in the tradition, but we couldn't kick it up in our special way."

As Derek explains, "We have a style as a band that comes out. The Kreellers sound comes from the energy, the rhythms, the Celtic style within us. That works out pretty well for us. We have worked hard at it, we are proud of it. We have come a long way.

"We had a trio in 2008, which was just starting to become a band (you can't really call yourself a band as a duo)," laughed Derek. Looking wider, they added percussionist TK. His first appearance with The Kreellers was two days before St. Patrick's Day, 2008.

"Baptism by fire," TK recalls. TK

had played with MindFreak magician, Chris Angel, on A&E, as well as performed for movies, such as Spiderman II and III and part of The Transformer movies. "Rock and Funk was the genre I played in. I had known Derek for about ten years, and they were looking for a drummer."

"It was a big change for Paul!" Derek added. "Paul is definitely the father of the group, the worry wart. He makes sure that everything happens that is supposed to happen. If it wasn't for Paul, nothing would ever get done. We call him Dad. Lord of the Flies—if Paul wasn't there we would probably have eaten each other a long time ago.

"We were lucky in 2008, to play a lot of Ohio festivals, the response was great. We decided we were going to continue to develop. In March of 2008, we took the name The Kreellers. The

name comes from friends of ours that played Gaelic Football. A big guy who delivers the big hit—your head is spinning—that is what it means to be 'Kreelled." We liked that. We wanted to deliver that for our fans. They don't know where they are—but they want more! So we took the name.

"A lot of people, when they come into hearus, expect one thing and get something totally different. We fill a void—slid right into it. People want more—and we're happy to oblige them. We feed off of that. That is what brings us into an even higher gear, if that is possible. The fan reaction is amazing. Indiana had the same response. Minneapolis, Washington. 



#### Sharing a Pint

I've been living a lie in these pages for the past four years, and the time has come to

To start with, my name isn't Scott Powers. I'm not from the North Side. I'm not, well, a lot of things you probably think I am if you've read this column. Everything I've written about oth-

ers is the complete truth, but forget all that I've said about myself.

My name is actually Padraig McGillicuddi. You can call me Paddy. My family is originally from Cork and moved to Chicago in the early 1900s. I grew up on the South Side. The rest are just details.

Four years ago, I offered my idea for Sharing a Pint to the Irish American News, and for four years my only plan has been to write this precise column. I apologize for deceiving you for so long, but soon you will understand.

My father is/was James McGillicuddi. He was born on the South

#### "Good Cop/Bad Cop"

"Good Cop/Bad Cop" is when two or more persons on the same team and trying to achieve the same goal try to fool someone into complying with their goals through various forms of deception.

As the federal government bails out the "Big 3" U.S. auto manufacturers with taxpayer dollars, consider the following scenario:

You buy a "New Car" from a car "Manufacturer," AMERICAN MO-TORS CORPORATION.

("AMC"), through an "Authorized Dealer" – e.g., Eddie Murphy AMC.

You also buy a "Service Contract" (a/k/a "extended warranty") from the authorized dealer, Eddie Murphy AMC, that is administered by AMERI-CAN MOTORS SERVICES, LLC.

You finance the vehicle through AMERICAN MOTORS CREDIT CORP., the lending arm of the car manufacturer.

The extended warranty you purchase is for 48 months/100,000 miles, whichever comes first.

Within the terms of the extended warranty, and with 95,000 miles on the vehicle, you bring the car into an authorized dealer of AMERICAN MOTORS CORPORATION, because the transmission is slipping. The authorized dealer finds nothing wrong and sends you on your way.

Again, within the terms of the extended warranty, and with 98,000 miles on the vehicle, you bring the car into an authorized dealer of AMERI-CAN MOTORS CORPORATION, because, again, the transmission is slipping. Again, the authorized dealer finds nothing wrong and sends you on your way.

terms of the service contract, when breach (i.e., failure or refusal to

you have 102,000 miles on the vehicle, your car breaks down and you're stranded on a road trip while driving through Texas. You call a tow truck and have the car towed to the nearest authorized dealer for AMFRICAN MOTORS CORPORATION. Lo and behold, you need a new transmission. And, since the car is no longer covered by the extended warranty, you are forced to charge over \$3,000 for a new transmission on your credit card.

Then, when you get home about a month later, AMERICAN MOTORS CREDIT CORP. repossesses your car because you are a couple of months behind in your monthly payments. AMERICAN MOTORS CREDIT CORP. sends you a notice of repossesat the time of the repossession, you are in receipt of a letter by AMERICAN MOTORS SERVICES, LLC, offering to pay \$1500 toward the repair, which would lend some credence to the argument that they were liable for making the repairs when the transmission broke down, if not before, You hire a lawyer. (In this scenario, the couple months past due payments owed to the lender, AMERICAN MOTORS CREDIT CORP., amounts to less than \$1,000 and you just spent over \$3000 out-of-pocket to pay for a repair in Texas to another authorized dealer of AMERICAN MOTORS CORPORATION that should have been performed for free under an extended warranty that you were sold by the Manufacturer's authorized dealer, Eddie Murphy AMC, and administered by the Manufacturer's subsidiary, AMERICAN MOTORS SERVICES, LLC.)

Your lawver notifies AMERICAN Then, shortly thereafter, outside the MOTORS CREDIT CORP. of the

honor the extended warranty) by AMERICAN MOTORS SERVICES. LLC, the company that failed to make necessary repairs under the terms of the extended warranty. AMERICAN MOTORS CREDIT CORP. informs you, that, that is a matter between you and them (AMERICAN MOTORS SERVICES, LLC), but they (AMERI-CAN MOTORS CREDIT CORP.) are a separate entity. Hmmm? Separate entity? Have they ever heard of each other? Can anyone use AMERICAN MOTOR'S name and logo if they are a separate, unrelated entity?

Despite your demand for return of the vehicle, and your attorney's letters to that effect with citation to relevant case law, AMERICAN MOTORS CREDIT CORP. is unmoved and auctions the car off and notifies you of the deficiency (i.e, they claim you owe them money!) Do you have an action against the lender, AMERICAN MO-TORS CREDIT CORP. for wrongful repossession and/or conversion?

This is not an uncommon scenario. sionanddemandspayment. Moreover, The authorized dealer acts like an innocent broker when problems go wrongwiththecarthattheyareunable to resolve. They might even "point the finger at" or blame the manufacturer  $and inform the customer that the {\it caris}$ a piece of junk and will usually be oh so generous as to offer "relief" in the form of a "generous" trade-in value for the lemon in exchange for another new car off the authorized dealer's lot. If the customer tries to "revoke acceptance" (a legal term meaning to cancel the sale and demand return of your money) of the car, the authorized dealer refuses to take it back, and the lender continues to demand its monthly payments; if you don't continue to pay, the lender will repossess the car. (In law school, "revocation of acceptance" seemed a simple concept. In the real world, without adequate consumer protection laws, it can mean protracted litigation.)

> Can the lender get away with this? Maybe not, if the lender is a "captive finance company," like AMERICAN MOTORS CREDIT CORP. and similar to Ford Credit, Chrysler Credit, etc. But then again, maybe so.

> In Valentino v. Glendale Nissan, Inc., Bank One repossessed a car and was then sued for conversion and violation of the Illinois Consumer Fraud and Deceptive Practices Act. The trial court dismissed the counts against Bank One and the appellate court affirmed the trial court and held that Bank One had a perfected security interest in the vehicle which entitled it to repossess the vehicle upon default, without the need for judicial intervention. The court found that the buyer's security interest arising under UCC Article 2 was subordinated to

the lender's security interest arising under UCC Article 9. In other words, the Bank One's security interest had priority. The trial court had reasoned the following:

...from an economic perspective, if the FTC Rule were to subordinate a creditor's security interest to that held by a buyer, it would have a significant, adverse effect on the availability of consumer credit. The creditor's right to take collateral securing the loan would be severely restricted, resulting in a substantial risk by the creditor in making a loan.

Does the same reasoning apply when the lender is a captive finance company (i.e., the lending arm of the manufacturer)? That is, when the lender is, for example, Chrysler Credit (as opposed to a third-party lender like Bank One) would it be less inclined to make a loan for the sale of a new Dodge/Jeep/Chrysler, manufactured by their parent corporation, if they were not able to repossess the vehicle after an alleged breach of warranty or extended warranty by Daimlerchrysler Corporation or Daimlerchrysler Services LLC? Would prohibiting a captive finance company (like Chrysler Credit or Ford Motor Credit) from repossessing the car after the consumer stops making payments have an adverse effect on the availability of consumer credit? Not likely when, in the case of a captive finance company (i.e., the lending arm of the manufacturer, a wholly owned subsidiary), curtailing the availability of consumer credit would also, in turn, have an adverse effect on the sale of its parent corporation's new cars.

In Christinson v. Venturi Construction Company, the court discussed the "close connection" doctrine, which holds that a purchaser of negotiable paper (e.g., the IOU or note you signed with American Motors Credit Corp. to finance the purchase of the car from the authorized dealer of American Motors Corporation) cannot be a holder in due course if its relationship with the transferor is too intimate. (The "purchaser of negotiable paper" would be a bank or other financial institution to whom the car dealer transfers the IOU or note—a/k/a "retail installment contract.") The case  $involved\,two\,commercial\,entities, not$ consumers, so the doctrine did not apply. But in the case of consumers, as in the AMERICAN MOTORS hypothetical scenario outlined above. does Illinois law provide adequate protection of consumers when, unlike Bank One in Valentino, supra, the lender is an entity related or "closely connected" to the seller—i.e., authorized dealer—and manufacturer? In Christinson, the court stated:

The close connection doctrine was apparently fashioned to preserve this remedy for the consumer: where two entities are interrelated, and one of the entities breaches an executory contract with a consumer, allowing the consumer to raise the seller's default as a defense against the financing entity provides realistic protection for the consumer.

Other jurisdictions have also addressed this issue. In Freeman v. Hubco Leasing, Inc., the Georgia Supreme Court stated the following:

Where two corporations are owned by the same stockholders and have the same directors and officers and where one of those corporations breaches in a material way its agreement with a consumer, causing the consumer to breach an agreement with the other corporation, the latter is estopped from insisting upon timely performance of its agreement with the consumer while its related corporation remains in default on its obligations to the consumer. Estoppel prevents two corporations having the same stockholders, directors and officers from squeezing a consumer like a pair of pliers held by a common hand, while one of those corporations continues to breach its contract with the consumer. It prevents one such corporation from collecting sums due from the middleman, until the other pays such damages as are due the middleman. We therefore affirm the denial of summary judgment to Hubco Leasing. For the same reason we reverse the trial court's order requiring Freeman to pay accumulated arrearage on the lease prior to Hub Motor's payment of sums as may be due to Freeman.

The question is whether the Illinois Supreme Court would ultimately hold in favor of the consumer in the above hypothetical involving the fictitious 'American Motors." I filed a case like it based on the same facts and same legal argument against one of the "big three" but it was several years ago, I was working for someone else's law firm at that time, and I don't know how it finally resolved. I assume it eventually settled out-of-court.

But this is how the American auto manufacturers treat consumers. What's the difference between a consumer and a tax-payer? Nothing. Amazing how the "big three" treat the tax-payers/consumers versus how thetax-payers/consumerstreatthebig three when the big three show up to Congress "with hat in hand." Thank Congress for that.

We fought a revolution over taxation without representation. Now we have our representation. Happy now?

#### A Great Civics Lesson: The Who, What, Where and Why of Impeachment

Most elected officials want to Historical Perspective make history in their offices. The mind. On January 9, 2009, Governor Blagojevich became the first governor in the history of the state of Illinois to be impeached. Since the Governor's arrest, a great civics lesson is unfolding in our legislative, executive and judicial branches.

Until now, no Illinois governor way our Governor is making his- has ever been impeached, let alone tory is probably not what he had in removed from office. According to the Chicago Sun-Times, the last time any public official was impeached in Illinois involved a Circuit Court judge in 1833. Nationally, in the history of this country only seven governors have been removed from office following impeachment, the last being Arizona

Governor Evan Meachum in 1988. At the federal level, two U.S. Presidents have been impeached: Andrew Johnson in 1868 and Bill Clinton in 1998. Notably, our Governor was then a member of the U.S. House of Representatives, and voted against impeaching Clinton. Johnson avoided being removed from office by just one vote, while Clinton defeated removal by a wider margin. Additionally, the House Judiciary Committee recommended Articles of Impeachment against President Nixon; however, Nixon resigned before the full house could vote, and thus avoided being impeached.

#### First Judicial Relief Sought

After the Governor's arrest, many questioned whether he could still effectively govern. Every other constitutional officer of Illinois immediately called on him to resign. When the Governor refused, Attorney General Lisa Madigan attempted to invoke Illinois Supreme Court Rule 382, which allows the Supreme Court of Illinois to determine the ability of the governor to serve office. Rule 382 had never previously been invoked to remove a governor from office. Madigan's argument was that because of the accusations against the Governor it was clear he was unable to "distinguish between his financial

interests and his official duties" and additionally that he had lost the ability to serve as Governor essentially  $\dot{b}ecause the public had no faith in him.$ Five days after the Attorney General filed her motion, the Supreme Court denied it without comment.

#### Second

#### Judicial Relief Sought

The ability of the Governor to continue to hold office was again seriously criticized on December 30, 2008, when the Governor appointed Roland Burris to fill the vacant senate seat of President Obama. The Certificate of Appointment form, used by the Governor to appoint Burris, has a place for the signature of the Secretary of State. However, the Illinois Secretary of State, refused to sign or place the state seal on the form. Burris argued that Illinois law requires the Secretary to sign the form and to affix the state seal on it. The Secretary argued he was only required to register the appointment in the official records of the state. Complicating the issue, the U.S. Senate refused to seat Burris or grant him any powers or responsibilities of a senator until the Illinois Secretary of State signed and sealed the appointment.

In an attempt to resolve the issue, Burris filed a Petition for a Writ of Mandamus with the Supreme Court of Illinois. Mandamus is an extraordinary remedy rarely invoked by the Supreme Court to compel a public official to perform a mandatory duty. If Burris was correct and the Secretary was required by state law to sign and seal the appointment, the Supreme Court could use its Mandamus power to compel the Secretary to do so.

However, the Court found that state law did not require the Secretary to sign or seal the appointment, but instead found that his only responsibility was to register the appointment. The Court did note that the Secretary would be required to produce to anyone who requested it and paid the proper fee, a certified copy of the appointment. The certified copy would contain the state seal and an attestation by the Secretary of State that it was a true and correct copy of the appointment. Based on this recommendation from the Court, Burris obtained a certified copy of the appointment, presented it to the U.S. Senate and was sworn in as a U.S. Senator.

#### The Impeachment **Process Begins**

The Illinois Constitution provides impeach the governor, or any other elected member of the executive or judicial branch. A majority vote is necessary to impeach. The Illinois Constitution does not define what constitutes an impeachable offense. However, the committee investigating the Governor noted that the impeachment power should be "reserved for serious abuses and misconduct."

In the case of the Governor, a special investigative committee was formed to investigate allegations of impeachable offenses and make a recommendation to the full house. The bipartisan committee was made up of 21 members and conducted 6 days of hearings before unanimously recommendingimpeachmenttothe full house.

The committee considered evidence of wide ranging allegations against the Governor, including: attemptingtoobtainfinancialandother benefitsforappointingareplacement for the U.S. Senate seat vacated by President Obama; attempting to give state financial assistance to the Tribune Company only if the Chicago Tribune would fire members of its editorial board that were critical of the governor; multiple instances of attempting to trade official acts for campaign contributions; paying for imported foreign flu vaccinations despite notification that the U.S. Food & Drug Administration would not approve the importation; and refusal to comply with Freedom of Information Act requests.

Based on the Committee's recommendation, the House voted to impeachtheGovernor, returning one Article of Impeachment, alleging that the Governor abused the power of his office in one or more of thirteen different ways.

#### An Impeached Official Continues to Hold Office

The impeachment of the Governor caused many to believe that it was enough to disallow him from continuing to hold office. There is a critical distinctionbetweenimpeachmentand removal from office. Similar to criminal charges by a grand jury, impeachment is an accusation of wrongdoing that begins the process. An impeached official continues to hold office unless or until a judgment is entered against him following a trial.

#### The Second Step in the **Impeachment Process:**

#### Trial in the State Senate

The Illinois Constitution requires that an impeached governor be tried with the State Senate acting as jurors and the Chief Justice of the Illinois Supreme Court as the presiding judge. The House of Representatives is required to appoint a prosecutor. To

In this instance, David Ellis, counsel to Illinois Speaker of the House Michael Madigan will serve as lead prosecutor. Once the prosecutor files the Article of Impeachment with the Senate, the Sergeant-at-Arms of the Senate will serve notice on the Governor and the Chief Justice as to when trial will begin. The Governor must file a written appearance and answer to the Article of Impeachment. If he fails to answer the Article of Impeachment or file an appearance, the trial will still proceed without him as if he had plead not guilty.

Like any trial court, the Senate will have the power to subpoena witnesses and documents and an individual can be held in contempt for failure to appear, or be compelled to give testimony. Unlike a typical trial, formal rules of evidence do not apply. The Governor or the prosecutor can object to the admission of certain evidence and the Chief Justice will rule on its admission. Interestingly, the Senate can reverse the ruling of the Chief Justice by a majority vote.

The trial will consist of opening statements, examination of witnesses, and closing argument. The prosecutor will have the first opportunity to question a witness, then the Governor or his counsel, then any senator who wishes to question a witness will also be allowed to do so by submitting a question in writing to the Chief Justice, who will then ask it of the witness.

Following the closing argument, the Senthe 59 senators must vote in favor of removal. ate will take a vote as to whether the Article of Impeachment should be sustained and the Governor removed from office. If more than one article of impeachment is presented, the articles should be voted on separately. In its present form, only one Article of Impeachment was entered against the Governor. As such, the article can be sustained and the Governor removed with a two-thirds vote of the Senate. Lt. Governor Patrick Quinn would then become Governor of Illinois.

If the Senate votes to remove the Governor from office, another vote will be taken as to whether he will be barred from holding any future public office in Illinois. This vote also requires the vote of two-thirds of the Senate. Conclusion

In the last two months we have seen an extraordinary exercise of powers by our three independent branches of government, the executive, legislative and judicial. The fact that they have moved along on such an important matter without major turmoil is an indication of the strength of our three-branch system on both the state and national level.

Lt. Governor Quinn has predicted that the trial will conclude before the celebration of Lincoln's 200th birthday on February 12, 2009. It may be concluded and we may have a new Governor at that time.


