The Northern Irish Election

In the local elections held on May 18th in Northern Ireland, the DUP struck the keynote when they campaigned on the pledge to 're-establish the Northern Ireland Assembly'. It was always clear that this election was going to be a referendum on the DUP's decision to refuse to go into the Assembly after it lost pole position to Sinn Féin in last May's Assembly election. Now their return to Stormont is inevitable—it is just that the DUP sought an explicit mandate to return. It is a pity, though hardly a shock, that it took them over a year to act democratically.

The DUP manifesto added that it would only do so 'on a fair and sustainable basis by finishing the job of protecting NI's place in the UK and its internal market'. Since finishing the job implies having started it, the DUP's record of protecting Northern Ireland's place in the UK is worth recalling.

Uniquely among the major parties on the island of Ireland, the DUP supported Brexit in the June 2016 UK referendum. Despite that drastic miscalculation, the DUP has the nerve to praise its credentials as a protector of NI's place in the UK. While many in Northern Ireland continue to support the union with the UK, they reject the canard that that position was compatible with support from Brexit.

The DUP could, at a minimum, be expected to own the consequences of its support for Brexit. Instead, it threw in its lot with Boris Johnson and the happy fantasy that the UK could leave the EU internal market and customs union without a process of examining goods crossing between the UK and the EU. It is unclear if Johnson ever fully believed that that was possible, but it was certainly unworkable from the start. The only solution to the conundrum was to move the customs border to the Irish Sea, aligning the customs regime in Northern Ireland with the rest of Ireland and the EU—a vista that appalled hardline unionists. Johnson duly betrayed the DUP at a meeting with his counterpart, Taoiseach Leo Varadkar, in Liverpool in October 2019. At that meeting, Johnson effectively conceded a customs border between Northern Ireland and the rest of the UK. That formed the basis of the Northern Ireland Protocol, agreed upon between London and the EU a few months later. The DUP has fumed about the Protocol ever since, which has achieved nothing more than leaving them isolated and humiliated in London. Hence the DUP's petulance and denial—the most tangible manifestation of which is the ongoing suspension of Stormont since the DUP refuses to participate in it.

The humiliation continued when Rishi Sunak took over as British Prime Minister and signed the Windsor Framework with the EU. The Framework was the Northern Ireland Protocol redux, with a few concessions thrown in. In March 2023, the Framework passed through the House of Commons by 515 votes to 29. Naturally, the DUP voted to reject it, thereby digging themselves deeper into the hole.

The DUP campaigned in the recent election to rectify 'the harm done by the imposition of the Protocol'. If they are not supported in this aim unionism, they claim, 'can divide and splinter, costing seats and influence in our councils and helping to hand seats and influence to those who would further weaken the Union'. Such a force for the good of the union: how could voters not support them?

While the local elections are fought on bread-and-butter issues, the spectre of the constitutional position is never far away. To that end, the DUP, the culprits for the collapsed Northern Ireland Assembly and the obstacle to its functioning ever since, has a useful suggestion. 'The DUP supports greater unionist cooperation and is the only unionist party large enough to challenge Sinn Fein'. Translation: do not give your first preference votes to other unionist parties because to do so is to dilute the unionist bloc and to further facilitate the dominance of Sinn Féin in Northern Ireland. Having told the electorate to give them their first preference vote, the DUP tells it where to give their second and third preferences: 'then transfer to other pro-Union candidates'.

Sinn Féin's having the First Minister position in Stormont, which it won in May 2022, is priced into the restoration of the Assembly. However, the restoration will likely not happen until this autumn. If it does happen then, it may be politically unwise to taunt the DUP for having wasted a year and a half and achieved nothing in the interim. That was a period in which Northern Ireland's already troubled economy and social structures stagnated still further and hospital queues got longer. Rather than taking that focus, Irish, EU and US leaders will continue to cajole the DUP to reap the gains that Northern Ireland can make through its government becoming active again and its economy operating with full access to two major markets, the UK and the EU.

The DUP's political leadership over the past year and a half has been shameful, but that is entirely in line with precedent. When Sinn Féin's Martin McGuinness resigned as Deputy First Minister in January 2017, thereby collapsing Stormont for what transpired to be three years, the then leader of the DUP criticised the decision since Northern Ireland was 'dealing with Brexit, needing to create more jobs and investing in our health and education system, Northern Ireland needs stability'.

Whatever the outcome of the local elections, the duopoly of the DUP and Sinn Féin will continue. And that way does not lie stability. A fresh vision is badly needed. Some of the opposition in Stormont, principally the SDLP's Colm Eastwood, has canvassed the position that for Northern Ireland to continue to have a voice it must 'rejoin the community of nations and get back home to the EU then it can only be done in a New Ireland'. However, there is all but no support for such a vision. Eastwood and the SDLP would secretly acknowledge that if they retain as many council seats this time as in the last election they would be doing well.



The impact of "Late Nite Catechism" has transcended its box office receipts, rave reviews, and audience entertainment. 

All told, "Late Nate Catechism" has directly raised over \$4 million for the woefully underfunded retirement accounts of various orders of nuns. This does not count the untold number of dollars that individuals have contributed on their own after seeing the show. 

How The Irish Saved Civilization by Thomas Cahill

"Charming and poetic... an entirely engaging, delectable voyage into the distant past, a small treasure."

-The New York Times

Recently, I rediscovered Thomas Cahill's book, How the Irish Saved Civilization. Cahill's work is a combination of scholarship and popular creative nonfiction. Cahill illustrates how Western civilization was "saved" by Irish monks copying out the great books, Christian and pagan, from The New Testament to Beowulf. The Irish monks with

great precision and labor, created remarkable illustrated books like "The Book of Kells" now in Dublin's Trinity College library. This rare surviving work from 800 AD displays the four gospels copied in Latin with a calligraphy that is—in itself—an example of extraordinary artwork, when a "T" can look like a colored serpent. Of course, elsewhere in Europe, the Jewish and Christian religious works were also preserved in Greek.

Cahill also examines the familiar story of Saint Patrick who converted the pagan Irish to Christianity even as ancient Rome was

There are many myths about Saint Patrick. He did not drive the snakes from Ireland, a tale I heard growing up, nor did the Shamrock have any Catholic symbolism. Saint Patrick was not named Patrick and was not even Irish, but a Roman Britain who in the 5th century was taken by roving Irish pirates at the age of 16. His real name was Maewyn Succat. He finally escaped his bondage, and after a prophetic dream, returned to Ireland determined to convert the pagan warring Irish to Christianity and abolish slavery in the process. When he was ordained a priest, Maewyn changed his name to Patricius, or Patrick which derives from the Latin term for "father figure."

"Patrick was really a first—the first missionary to barbarians beyond the reach of Roman law," Thomas Cahill writes in How the Irish Saved Civilization.





I also feel a stronger imaginary connection to pagan Druids than catholic priests and nuns. (James Joyce called the

Irish a "priest-ridden race.") It is true, however, that the Irish tribes were savage fighters who took slaves and cut off heads. This is reflected in their own Irish works like "The Cattle Raid of Cooley" or "The Táin" often referred to as an Irish Iliad. The monks replaced severed heads with books.

Cahill's book is indeed a "small treasure" as the NY times critic suggested. Read his Irish history and travel to Dublin to see the Book of Kells. Since the Viking and German "barbarians" were illiterate and destroyed libraries on their raids, we owe a debt to those Irish monks who copied and preserved much of Western literature.





How Dare I Abridge Ulysses!?

by Michael James Fallon

One frayed, faded newspaper clipping and two aged letters were tucked inside the cover of the tainted clothbound copy of James Joyce's ULYSSES, which I inherited upon the death of "Grandpa with the pipe." The sepiatoned clipping with a photo of James Joyce, round glasses, eye-patch, pencil-thin mustache, pinstripe shirt and bowtie, announced the historic decision whereby the Federal ban on his book was removed. The first letter dated April 1934, read in part: "I am sending you, Tom, this book by James Joyce, called Ulysses... you will find the book a bit hard to read... but I found entertainment in it." The second letter to my grandpa stated: "I'm returning Ulysses with only 200 pages read... Have gone back to it no less than two dozen times, this in spite of breathtaking passages... Surely Joyce is a master of artistic license.'

And so my saga with Ulysses began. I took up reading Ulysses in 2004, out loud, oceanside in Maui. Joyce's 1922 Ulysses, a controversial classic judged obscene

and banned in the U.S. 100 years ago, is one of the Great Books. Radical in its day for its modernist construction, stream of consciousness narrative, and its unvarnished exploration of sexuality, Ulysses - like the Sirens of Homer's Odyssey upon which it is based - calls to readers, albeit daunting due to its length and composition. Yet it remains a mustread-someday.

Ulysses is primarily the story of a sensitive man, his adulterous wife, both a deceased and a surrogate son, and a perplexed young man, three persons who individually and together, endeavor to make sense of life on their interrelated journeys through Dublin on June 16,

1904, now dubbed "Bloomsday." Having conceived at some point to condense the novel for general readership, I had the good fortune in 2013 to participate

in Bloomsday in Dublin. For the next ten years, I upon all Americans to celebrate the achievements and contributions of Irish Americans to our Nation with appropriate ceremonies, activities, and programs.'

Sadly, too often, that call falls upon deaf ears when it


comes to the Media and our Educational institutions who

A friend of mine recently did her genealogy. She called me and asked me if I knew anything about a lady called Biddy Early. Apparently, she popped up as a distant relative so we both began to explore. I have her permission to share this story with Bridget Ellen Early(née O'Conner.) She was born in 1778 in

county Clare Ireland. Her mother was no one for her horrible cures. She taught her daughter all she knew, but unfortunately, by the time biddy was 16 years old, she lost her mother to malnutrition. Months later, her father died of typhus. Poor Biddy ended up in the poo house, but she did meet an older gent in Limerick. He was twice her age and they wed and had a son.

She started using her mothers, herbal remedies to help surrounding neighbors. She never asked for money, but folks would leave food items and poitin (sounds like potcheen) her husband died when she was 25. She then married his son from a previous relationship. By the time she was 42. He also passed away. She ended up marrying Tom from county Clare. They had a little cottage in Kilbarin overlooking a lake, which later would become known as Biddy Early's Lake.

When people couldn't afford to pay doctors, they went to Biddy. Farmers also went to her to help with their animals. The death of an animal meant poverty and eviction If they couldn't plough their fields or have fresh milk to sell they

time. Unfortunately, he died a year later. Biddy was left alone and died in 1874. sadly she died in poverty. She is buried in Freakle, county Clare

Ireland. By all accounts, Biddy was a kind no nonsense independent soul. Maybe I'll take my friend to Ireland to visit her

Growing up in Ireland people would travel for miles to find someone to cure their ailments. My father had the cure for sprains which he later passed on to me when I went home to look after him while my mum was in hospital getting hip replacement surgery.

The sequence is Father to daughter then I passed it on to my son. I'm not sure who made up these rules but I'm sure there's an explanation out there somewhere.

My husband's father was the seventh son of a seventh son. He had the cure for ringworm people who would come with their children from miles around. There was never any money exchanged; they would leave a cake or loaf of bread and cheese, maybe fresh eggs. I remember my father taking me to see Mrs. Brady so she could help me with back pain after a car crash I had as a teenager. She had a piece of string and she would measure my hips and back. I was never sure what she was doing but she would mumble prayers and ask me to come back three times.

Did it help me? I'm not sure, but the platform shoes I wore didn't help either.

Then there were the fortune tellers



She finally gave up her nursing registration when So&Sew Crafts took its place, adding that their children Aaron, 24, who also works for the company, and Katie, 26,

a Sustainability Analyst for delivery company DHL Ireland, are both big supporters.

When making a new cushion, Jennie will photograph the landmark or location, then edit the photo to portray the ideal effect that she wishes to create. That image is then digitised to create an embroidery pattern.

"It's a meticulous process which requires a lot of tweaking to arrive at the final product which I am completely happy with," she says. "Katie also appreciates the fact that any finished cushion with even a tiny imperfection ends up as

soft furnishing in her own small apartment!"

Once the pattern is digitized, she uses it over and over again, and, depending on the complexity of the design, to make a cushion from start to finish takes between two to four hours.

Cushion sizes vary, usually by request, but these days, now that Sew&So is taking up more and more of her time, Hughes has stopped taking commissions for now. In fact, she admits that she has always preferred to be "the master of my own creativity."

When she does get free time, Jennie enjoys walking by the coast and spending time with friends. She also likes gardening, and looking after her many pets, which include a dog, hens and ducks. She and Richard also enjoy travelling in their Motorhome.

"This time last year we did a month in Portugal, this year we are planning a month in France and Italy around September time. We also love just heading off to the North Coast for a couple of nights, or to Donegal. Anywhere there is a beach really, and not too many people, and a chilled glass of wine. Also, going across America in a RV is definitely on my bucket list!"





For the salad:

12oz mixed green or arugula

3 peaches

1 pound 16/20 shrimp head on optional

4 oz crumbled goat's cheese

Slivered red onion

2oz wheat grass

4oz plain Greek yogurt

2oz Dijon mustard

1oz agave syrup or honey

1 oz fresh lemon juice

4 oz sunflower or grape seed oil

NE OF MY FAVORITE childhood memories is the ride to the creamery, sitting proudly beside my uncle Seán on his horse and cart after milking the cows. It was a daily occurence for him, a small farmer in north County Kerry. For me, it was the highlight of our annual family vacation. Nevertheless I am certain that Seán enjoyed these morning trips every bit as much as I did. He would click at Billy, the enormous shire horse pulling the cargo, on the face of it to give directions, but Billy knew every inch of the three mile route. I once asked Seán why he did not use any of the motorized vehicles he owned to deliver the milk? He just smiled and winked, and asked me if I liked being up on the horse and cart, surveying the beautiful countryside. When I answered that I did, he simply said: "So do I."

That was nearly fifty years ago, and the island of Ireland has changed a lot since. But not as much as you might think. Slowing down and "smelling the roses" is still the optimal way to experience all that is on offer. Reducing the pace a bit will allow you to really appreciate the island of Ireland's scenic splendor, its history, and its culture and traditions. Taking the time to fully explore your surroundings will pay big dividends.

This legacy of history, culture, and beauty is one of Ireland's great gifts. We want to protect it for future generations. As visitors we can play a big part in this effort. One very practical way to do this is by supporting any of the thousands of proud local producers

and gifted craftspeople who have amazing offerings to share. By buying their goods, frequenting their restaurants, and spreading the word, we can do our bit to help sustain them.

Here are some suggestions of ways in which you can embrace slow and sustainable travel around the island of Ireland.

Walking, hiking, cycling

There is no better way to enjoy your vacation than by getting out in the open air. Walking atop a sea cliff, alongside a river or canal bank, or on any of the majestic hills and mountains will bring you face to face with stunning landscapes and unique flora and fauna. The possibilities are almost endless but one thing is for certain, you will never be more than a stone's throw away from somewhere wonderful to stretch your legs.

There are many trails and established routes, which showcase the unspoilt beauty of the island. Some of the most stunning are to be found along the Wild Atlantic Way and Causeway Coast. Both routes hug the coastline, and are nicely varied with mountainous paths for adventurous souls, as well as gentler terrain. On the Wild Atlantic Way, the Beara, Dingle and Inishowen Peninsulas are all wonderful locations, while special mention, too, goes to the hilly routes around Achill Island in County Mayo.

The grandeur of the rugged North Antrim Coast and the deep glens set against the pastoral farmland create other worlds away from busy life.

The Copper Coast Geopark, named after the mining

industry that once prospered in Ireland's Ancient East, is a breathtaking shoreline of cliffs, coves and sea stacks.

Cycling, too, is huge in Ireland. There are many cycling stores which offer rentals at affordable prices. Most allow you to drop off at a different location for a small fee. There are a number of 'Greenways,' specially designed for cyclists, which not uncoincidentally traverse some of the most outstanding areas of natural beauty. Examples include the Great Western Greenway, which stretches from the town of Westport to Achill Island; or the Waterford Greenway, which runs between Dungarvan and Waterford City. The Kingfisher Trail covers 300 miles, and consists of landscape dominated by mountains and lakes. The trail straddles counties Fermanagh, Leitrim, Cavan, Donegal and Monaghan, and cyclists will find plenty of punchy climbs for a tough test or gently winding lanes between villages for those in search of something more modest. As for tranquil scenery, the inky waters of Lough Erne will oblige, while the Cuilcagh Mountain is a dominant presence as you head north.

Public transport

Using public transport allows you you get around the island very efficiently while doing your bit to protect the environment. Every major town and city is well served with bus routes. Dublin has a train system, the DART (Dublin Area Rapid Transit), and a tram network LUAS. Train travel between counties is also very easy and in most cases quicker than driving. Dublin to Belfast, Cork or Galway for example

takes only 2.5 hours by rail. If you get a chance, take a trip on one of the old railway lines that pass through some amazingly scenic areas.

Coaches too, are an affordable and efficient way of travelling around. You can board a coach from outside Dublin Airport, for example, to almost any destination on the island for a fraction of the cost of getting there by car.

Supporting local food producers

The quality of locally produced Irish food and drink is second to none. The Irish pride themselves on it. The many food festivals and epicureanguided tours available are testament to this.

One superb way to get to meet the local producers and to taste their wares is by spending a few hours at a Farmer's Market. These community-based enterprises are to be found all across the island. Listed here are a few fine examples.

Cork's elegantly vaulted English Market is one of the oldest of its kind in the world (established in 1788) is not to be missed. Nor is the artisan food hotspot of Midleton Farmers' Market, about 16 miles east of Cork City. Darina Allen's own Ballymaloe Cookery School has a stall here, and you'll also find Frank Hederman's award-winning smoked salmon. Belfast's award-winning St George's Market operates Friday through Sunday each week. Built in the late 19th Century, it is a gourmet treasure trove and an eclectic mix of traditional and modern life in the city. The Naas Farmers' Market in County Kildare is open every Saturday,

and includes organic produce from the Wicklow hills, fresh breads, farmhouse cheeses, and sweet treats from ChocOneill Chocolates.

The island of Ireland is replete with opportunities to slow down and relax—which is what any good vacation is all about after all—whether on foot, on a bike, or even on horseback or a riverboat. Being sustainable and environmentally-friendly is also part of the deal. The Irish government has implemented many of the best practices found around the world in this effort, and the tourism industry has fully embraced these.

Shopping locally, eating locally produced food, and enjoying the natural surroundings as they were meant to be enjoyed are some of the most rewarding in which you can help.

Living in the moment is the Irish way. Bloomsday, which is celebrated on June 16 each year, commemorates the famed Irish writer James Joyce. The day is named for Leopold Bloom, the lead character in Joyce's novel Ulysses, written in 1922 and widely accepted as one of the finest works of literature ever written in the English language. In Ulysses Joyce recounts, in unique and innovative prose, the events of just a single day in the life of Bloom. Each act, each event, no matter how small or insignicant it might at first appear, becomes a story in and of itself. There is a lesson here for us all.

Take it easy if you are visiting Ireland this year, you'll get a lot more out of your trip, I promise.

I'm sure you've heard about the Writers Guild Strike - in a sentence, it's over revenue and royalty shares from the now-dominant world of streaming, and about worries over the use of Al (i.e., potentially replacing writers entirely) so you can see why they have taken to the picket lines).

As a result, almost all TV shows and movies have come to a juddering halt, especially any with American connections, and since other crew members usually stop work in solidarity too, Hollywood is now waiting to see what happens.

Even so, I'm still going to give you the news about movies that are filming (or were planning to) in Ireland, or are coming down the pipeline in the future, but for now we'll start with one that is due to get its premiere this month.

The Miracle Club is taking a bow as the Official Selection in this year's Tribeca Film Festival in New York, as part of the Spotlight Narrative strand.

Directed by Emmy nominee Thaddeus O'Sullivan (Vera, Call the Midwife), the story follows three close friends (Laura Linney, Maggie Smith and Kathy Bates) who have never left the outskirts of Dublin (much less Ireland) on the journey of a lifetime - a visit to Lourdes, the picturesque French town, and place of miracles.

The Miracle Club is based on the screenplay by Irish screenwriter Jimmy Smallhorne, co-written by Joshua D. Maurer and Timothy Prager, and also features Oscar nominee Stephen Rea and Agnes O'Casey in its main cast.

A co-production between Ireland and the UK, it shot on location in Dublin and Wicklow last year, and after the Tribeca Film Festival, which runs from 7th to the 18th this month, we should see it on our screens sometime soon.

Back in Wicklow again, and principal photography has begun on Small Things Like These, with the cast and crew arriving in New Ross for four weeks of filming.

Cillian Murphy (Peaky Blinders, the upcoming Oppenheimer) will star in the

adaptation of the book by Irish author Claire Keegan. Actors Emily Watson (God's Creatures) and Ciarán Hinds (Belfast) will feature alongside, and the screenplay was adapted by Enda Walsh, long-time collaborator of Cillian Murphy on theatrical productions such as Grief Is The Things With Feathers.

Set in an Irish town in 1985, the film follows coal and timber merchant Bill Furlong (Murphy) as he struggles with his conscience and the fear of standing up to church powers after he discovers the convent's treatment of unmarried mothers and their babies.

Quay Street, O'Hanrahan Bridge, Conduit Lane, and Michael Street will feature as shooting locations, with other locations under consideration, and the cast and crew of 80 people will be based in St Joseph's School on Michael Street, and the Old Fire Station on Davitt Road.

Fresh off her Oscar-nomination for the Banshees of Inisherin, Kerry Condon has been announced as joining Brad Pitt in Apple Studios' currently untitled F1 racing film from director Joseph Kosinski (Top Gun: Maverick).

Produced by Jerry Bruckheimer, Chad Oman and seven-time Formula One champion Lewis Hamilton, the story of retirement to mentor a younger driver and join the younger driver as his teammate. Condon is set to play the team's Technical Director, overseeing the design and development of the race car.

Condon is super-busy right now: she will be seen next with Jude Law in Star Wars: Skeleton Crew, directed by Jon Watts and written by Chris Ford (Spider-Man: Homecoming), and will also star in supernatural thriller Night Swim alongside Wyatt Russell.





She is also slated to join the cast follows Pitt as a racer who comes out of In The Land Of Saints And Sinners alongside many of her fellow Irish natives including Liam Neeson, Ciarán Hinds, Sarah Greene, Colm Meaney, Jack Gleeson, and Seamus O'Hara (An Irish Goodbye).

> Another actor nominated for his touching performance in Banshees, Barry Keoghan, is reported to be playing Emperor Geta in Ridley Scott's highly anticipated Gladiator Sequel, joining another Irish nominee, Paul Mescal (Aftersun) who is playing protagonist Lucius (the grown-up nephew of Joaquin Phoenix's Commodus from the original 2000 movie).


Plot details are currently under wraps, and it has not been confirmed whether any cast members from the original will be returning. The sequel was officially greenlit by Paramount Pictures in 2018, with a screenplay by Peter Craig (The Town, The Batman), and legendary director Scott is set to begin production on the film once he has wrapped his upcoming biopic Napoleon starring Phoenix as the French political leader.

Reports of a sequel have been swirling since the original movie, and Gladiator 2 is currently set to arrive around Thanksgiving 2024 - but I'm sure a lengthy WGA strike might affect that, so we'll have to wait and see...
