

'Kathy White House -Her Culinary Odyssey' documents the life of Listowel woman Kathy Buckley who was Head Cook for three past American presidents.


Kathy Buckley was born in Upper William Street in Listowel, Co. Kerry. She was the eldest of seven. Her father worked as a cooper in a workshop at the rear of their house, and her mother came from a long-established family of grocers and shoemakers. When Kathy was in her early teens she left school to take a job in the kitchen of the Butler Arms Hotel in Waterville. She showed a talent for cooking, and eventually that flair would take her all the way to the White House. Kathy was appointed Head Cook for the duration of the term of office of President Calvin Coolidge (1923 - 1929) and for the presidential terms of both Herbert Hoover and Franklin Delano Roosevelt.

She would look back upon this time with fondness when she eventually retired to Listowel in the early 1950s. By that stage, she had earned the nickname "Kathy White House" in the town and she often regaled her family and friends with tales of her time among the powerful and famous. She brought mementos of her time in the White House back with her to Listowel when she retired. They remain there to this day. Kathy broke her hip in 1969 and spent some time in a nursing home in Listowel before she died.

Vincent Carmody has included recipe books and menu cards that Kathy collected on her travels. There are also letters Kathy received from Herbert Hoover's wife Lou Henry, as well as the key that President Coolidge received when he was given the freedom of Fort Worth in Texas. He gave this to Kathy as a gift when he returned from that city.


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# The Voice of Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese

How Catholic Charities is helping the city's migrant housing crisis

While you may be seeing stories in the news about asylum seekers in Chicago needing shelter for the winter, you may not be aware that Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Chicago has assumed a critical role in the response this housing crisis.

Jesus calls us to serve anyone in need, regardless of their faith, gender, race, ethnicity, and—particularly now—citizenship. When the buses of migrants began arriving from Texas late last summer, our teams were there to greet them and connect them with on-the-ground resources. We also provided reunification support for arrivals who did not want to stay in Chicago, connecting them to friends and relatives in other parts of the country. To date, we have helped over 2,000 reunite with their loved ones.

But for those families that had decided to stay in Chicago, the city was grappling with where they would live. So, in late 2022, our government partners approached us to help with case management of families to transition them out of an increasingly overstretched shelter system.

"Resettlement" refers to the process of helping displaced people from other countries find a safe place to live and assistance meeting their basic needs. For many of the migrants who are coming to the U.S., they are fleeing extreme poverty and unsafe conditions.

We studied the situation and decided that, drawing on our deep experience in homelessness prevention and refugee resettlement, we were prepared to step up to address what was quickly turning into a crisis.

We deployed a small team to undertake this work, which we have expanded as our experience (and the need) has grown. With funding from the State of Illinois, we now have 60 people who have joined us just for this response. Most are bilingual and are themselves either immigrants to Chicago or have close

family and friends who are. The team is persistent, focused, and committed.

We are proud to report that at the time of publication, we have connected approximately 7,400 individuals (representing roughly 2,900 households) to leased housing in Chicago and nearby suburbs. We are currently on pace to sign 500 leases a month.

The availability of apartments has been the biggest, and an ongoing, surprise for our team. Landlords, many of whom are increasingly reaching out to us, are some of the unsung heroes of this crisis. They are opening their



units to migrants.

Our success continues to depend on a robust network of community partners who help with move-in support, furniture and household items, and with the ongoing partnership and collaboration of our city and state leaders and agencies, who provide critical emergency funding.

It is important to note that this work has not impacted our longstanding homelessness prevention programs for neighbors in need who have encountered setbacks. We continue to serve thousands of residents in Cook and Lake counties daily - touching the lives of over 375,000 people each year. Some we serve only once, others we see weekly.

Our teams are (and will remain) focused on addressing the many critical needs of the communities, families, and individuals we are called to serve and accompany. That is our mission - to be there for people in need, the vulnerable, the hungry, the lonely.

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### Indoor Play Facilities - Should You Sign A Waiver on Behalf of Your Child?

With the approaching winter weather and upcoming holidays, we will all be seeking out ways to keep our children entertained. On a cold snowy Chicago day, there is nothing better than bringing your bundle of energy child to an indoor play place so that they can burn off some steam and you can get a much needed five minutes to yourself. But did you know that if your

child is injured in an indoor play place, you may, unbeknownst to yourself, have agreed that they cannot sue the facility for any injuries they sustain while playing at the facility, no matter how serious those injuries might be.

I recently learned of a court ruling which everyone should be aware of when agreeing to enter in to these play areas/facilities. In a written opinion a few weeks

ago a U.S. District Judge Franklin U. Valderrama of the Northern District of Illinois granted a motion by Chicago Urban Air, LLC, doing businesses as Urban Air Trampoline and Adventure, to force the case to arbitration and a parents lawsuit on behalf of their child was stayed/postponed while the arbitration is heard.

On April 1, 2022, Kirstin Headlee, and her daughter,

K.H., a minor, visited Urban Air, which operates an indoor trampoline and adventure park. Before K.H.

was permitted to participate in any of the park's attractions, an Urban Air employee informed Headlee that she had to sign a pre-

drafted "release" on a kiosk display. Her mother signed the release and indemnification agreement, which included an arbitration clause, on her own behalf and

on behalf of K.H.

The "Wipeout" attraction, according to the park's website, includes a cushioned bar that swings around an enclosed area. It consists of two machineoperated bars that require participants to hop or duck under the bars as the bars rotate in a circle. The challenge of struck by the bar. While playing

K.H., by and through her parents and legal guardians, Headlee, and her husband Tyson, sued Urban Air in state court for compensation for her injuries, asserting common law claims of negligence and premises liability,

as well as a claim under the Illinois Family Expense Act. Urban Air filed a motion to stay proceedings in the courts and demanded that the case be settled by arbitration (which would not be before a jury) because the child's parent had signed a release and waiver on admission to the facility. The family countered that the release's arbitration clause was not enforceable and therefore Urban Air's motion to compel arbitration must be denied for several reasons.

They first argued that the circumstances in which the arbitration clause was signed and formed were procedurally unconscionable. Under Illinois law, procedural unconscionability refers to a contract "where the attraction is to avoid being a term is so difficult to find, read, or understand that the plaintiff cannot fairly be said to have been aware he was agreeing to it, and also takes into account a lack

> The Headlees argued the release was offered on a "take" it or leave basis" and that Urban Air never explained the rights they would give up by signing it. They argued the text of the release was too small — with no option to enlarge it - and edits to the text were not allowed. The Headlees further reasoned that they possessed no bargaining power and were pressured by an Urban Air employee to "hurry up" and sign the release. They allegedly did not know that agreeing to the arbitration clause would bar them from bringing a law suit.

> Urban Air contended that it had no obligation to explain the release and the court agreed as under Illinois law, one who signs a contract is presumed to have read it and understood it.

> The Court agreed and stated, "As Urban Air points out, Kirstin could have walked away, but instead she signed the Release, thereby allowing her and K.H. to access the premises."

> The Headlees also argued enforcement of the arbitration clause would violate K.H.'s constitutional right to a trial by jury.

> In his reasoning, the Judge noted that the parties do not cite, nor is the court aware of, any Illinois decision that addresses the precise issue of whether a parent or guardian may waive a child's right to a jury trial in favor of arbitration clauses found in recreational releases.

> The Headlee's cited out-of-state case law finding that a parent cannot bind a minor child to an arbitration clause. Urban Air disagreed, arguing that the out of state case law not only is outdated, but also has been rejected as "reflecting an outmoded hostility to arbitration."

> The Court, in its ruling, did not address these unsettled question of whether a parent can bind their child to a release or waiver but instead ruled that because the child was an intended beneficiary of the contract, the child was therefore bound to the arbitration provision in the contract and the case could not proceed to a jury trial. The case in the law courts will now be stayed pending arbitration.

> Most facilities now require you to sign such waivers, releases, and indemnifications on entering any indoor play facility. In doing so please read what you are signing and if possible, ask for a hard copy of the release so you can go over it in greater detail. You can strike through those paragraphs you don't agree with and initial the strike through as an indication you are not agreeable to this particular aspect of the agreement but be warned a facility may refuse entry if you do so. And they would be within their rights to do so.

> If your child or children have been injured in an indoor or outdoor play park or area, you will need the advice of an attorney with knowledge of the law surrounding injuries in these circumstances. My colleagues and I have litigated these types of cases in the past and are familiar with all the pertinent aspects of the law. ### Irish Times Wins Instagram @Chicagopubs Best Irish Pub

By Ryanne Gallagher Johnson Since the pandemic, a lot of restaurants, bars, and other service establishments have struggled to thrive or even survive. Many long-standing community staples have shut down over the last four years, and even more have found difficulty in keeping up with low patronage and rapidly rising inflation. The challenges increase with the onset of cold winter months in areas like Chicago, where people prefer to stay in the warmth of their homes, rather than venture out into freezing temperatures and snow.

Enter Nick Hnatusko and Conor Yerkes. Two Irish descendants born and raised in Chicago, these guys have a love for Irish beer and Irish pubs that they come by honestly. Hnatusko's grandmother emigrated from County Cork to the Southside of Chicago, and Yerkes's grandparents hail from the Counties of Cork and Kerry. And for the last two years, they have helped reinvigorate the community surrounding the Chicago pub scene, encouraging people to once again venture out and experience the wide variety of establishments the city has to offer.

"December, January, February in Chicago, there's kind of a lull in going out and doing a lot of the things. Everyone's stuck inside," explains Conor. "So we started going to the bars and taking pictures, [which developed into] taking a minute long video outside of the pub, telling what we

thought of it. . . What do we think about the pour? What do The staff?"

With these informative videos, Conor and Nick spawned their very own Instagram account, @chicagopubs. Each establishment they review on their page is rated with a score of one through five, on ten different metrics: Price for a pint of Guinness, Guinness pour, Bartender, Ambiance, Games, Music, Food, Deals, TVs, and the "X-Factor" for the place. Then they each receive a final overall rating.

One reason for starting this project was to get themselves out of the routine of visiting the same places over and over

"There's a lot of really cool Mom & Pop pubs and general bars all throughout Chicago that need the support and are awesome spots," says Nick. "The community is already here, but if you can get more community built online, that can really amplify some of these places. That really helps the bar owners and the bar patrons."

Although the account was started under the assumption that only friends and family would be interested, it's grown to have a current following of

The notoriety of the Instagram account has even crossed the ocean. "We've gotten a lot of people from Ireland that have messaged us," says Conor. "One guy has come over from Belfast, [and] he messaged us when he got here, 'Where should I go?', 'Where's a good pour?'. So, it's a huge connection with a lot of these folks."

Martin adds that bar owners in Ireland have asked him to reach out if Nick and Conor are ever in town. "They know what's gonna come after them. They're gonna create a spotlight — a very positive, good spotlight on the bars. It's been brilliant."

In communities that have a large Irish population, like Chicago, Irish pubs hold a special importance. Often, when people emigrate from Ireland, that's the first place they'll visit.

"That's where they'll get a job, meet connections, get a place to live. It's all through the pub. It's the cornerstone of the community, and it has been for generations. We'll continue to do that. If you land [in the U.S.], you come straight to an Irish pub, you talk to somebody, and you'll get help."

Irish pubs have a unique atmosphere and vibe, and we'd like to encourage everybody to get out and experience the wide variety of them that the city has to offer.

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
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### PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Reheat the pudding until warm and invert on a plate or dish. Pour the remainder of the toffee sauce equally over the puddings. Top with ice cream, (Optional) 2 tablespoons custard or whipped cream. Serve immediately, and watch the happy faces.

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
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




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








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








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### John Plunkett Adds a New Chapter to Family Furniture Dynasty

In 2009, Plunkett Furniture officially ceased operations, closing its six remaining stores and serving as another casualty of the Great Recession. For its customers, it represented the end of an era for this recognizable and well-respected furniture chain in the Chicago area. For John Plunkett, it meant the end of the only place of



business he had ever known. He and his wife Valerie were forced to consider where they could get health insurance and how to remain financially secure, no small tasks given that their four children were all in school at the time.

Fast forward to 2023, and John and Valerie have completely reinvented their business with John Plunkett Interiors, a Wilmette-based luxury design firm offering both concierge interior design services for projects of all sizes, and direct access to renowned home furnishing brands.

How were they able to rise from the depths of the Great Recession to find success in adding another chapter to the Plunkett Furniture story? To answer this question, we must first go back a century ago to Chicago's west side, where John's grandfather, Hugh Plunkett, faced a challenge not altogether different remodeling or home additions, often working directly with from the one facing John in 2009.





### Jacqueline Kennedy **Onassis: A Life**

By Donald Spoto

With almost 29 biographies of Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis extant, this one by the American biographer and theologian Donald

Spoto may be the best. Spoto gives a more nuanced portrait of this complex woman.

When time stood still in 1963 on that fateful day in Dallas, Texas---Jacqueline Kennedy at 34 showed the world how to mourn.

Then with meticulous detail

she planned a simple but majestic funeral the likes of which have never been witnessed in this country before or since.

With one bold stroke, this brilliant young woman with her precocious sense of history ensured forever her husband's legacy. Singlehandedly in a time of grave national crisis she rescued a nation.

Spoto's research is impeccable; gleaned from documents at schools she attended; and interviews with those who knew her best; and her colleagues at Doubleday where she worked as an editor; and from the archives of the John F. Kennedy Library and from her own words.

Spoto captures a strong sense of place and a vanishing way of life at Lasata, the Bouvier's ancestral estate in East Hampton where Jackie's grandfather Major Bouvier presided. This was a place Jackie loved as a child as evidenced in a letter to her step-brother Yusha—"I always loved it at Merrywood so peaceful with the river and the dogs and listening to the Victrola..."


No one worked more gallantly or nobly on behalf of these literary traditions than the poet William Butler Yeats. Who 100 years ago received the Nobel Prize for Literature for his gifted words and poetic imagination. 1923 was a grand year for the Irish. Echoing a huge change in Irish political life as an independent state at last. But 1916 had been lashed down in tears and death with armed rebellion against Britain. Independent nationhood, at last, was the goal after centuries of struggle. Warfare and sacrifice became a deep part of Irish life. Yeats' poetry catalogued the cost of rebellion in his poem "Easter, 1916."

Too long a sacrifice Can make a stone of the heart. O when may it suffice? That is Heaven's part, our part To murmur name upon name, As a mother names her child When sleep at last has come On limbs that had run wild. What is it but nightfall? No, no, not night but death; Was it needless death after all? For England may keep faith For all that is done and said. We know their dream; enough To know they dreamed and are dead;

And what if excess of love Bewildered them till they died? I write it out in a verse-MacDonagh and MacBride And Connolly and Pearse Now and in time to be, Wherever green is worn, Are changed, changed utterly: A terrible beauty is born.

Yeats was an etherial poet in the cultural ethos of his Protestant ascendancy traditions. The son of a successful portrait painter whose family roots in Ireland unfolded in the lifetime commercial shipping life of Sligo's seaport traditions. 
Academy awarded him the Nobel Prize For Literature in 1923. He was remarkably frank, and unusually self effacing when it was announced that he was to be so honored. He looked at the gesture as a larger one of friendship and European courtesy toward Ireland itself. The nation was recovering from the brutal Civil War that followed receiving independence from Britain. Yeats suggested that while he was grateful for the honor, he was deeply touched to see the Irish Free State welcomed so resolutely to Europe.

"I consider that this honour has come to me less as an individual than as a representative of Irish literature, it is part of Europe's welcome to the Free State.'

WB Yeats was, of course, a product of his time and place. His Ireland was also an Ireland of its time and place. The dawn of the age of invention and inventiveness. A world evolving into a modern age.

His contribution to the literary character of Ireland is almost without measure. Without equal. His personal understanding of the turmoil and disharmony within Irish life found dynamic remedy in his poetry. A re-awakening of



We Are Blessed here living in a park as our park district would make a huge ice skating rink. Our kids used it the most as it's just outside our back gate.

They're all grown up now but still come home for the holidays and love the snow as much as ever.

A friend of mine gave me a Daniel O Donnell CD of gospel and Christmas hymns. My mum liked him. I think it's because he was from Donegal too. I put in in my car but forgot about it until I was stuck outside Menards waiting for my other half to run in and exchange something. He was taking forever as menards sell tools, so he was probably having a good old time browsing like we do when we go into our favorite store. So I popped the Daniel Cd in. Very nice I thought but it actually made me feel quite homesick. I was surprised when in the middle of it he started chatting in an American accent and said, "have you ever heard about the traveling preacher, a wonderful, wonderful man?" He walked the entire States on foot saving souls. He was feeling lonely and needed to talk to

someone. He was traveling between two towns when at a distance he saw someone. He seemed to be on his own as well but he was taking one step forward, two steps, back one or two steps to the side, he noticed beside him, Johnny Walker and Jack Daniels.

This preacher could take anything but hated the demon drink. He hated it with a passion. When he got up close to this man he derided him. when he had finished giving out. He asked him have you ever been baptized? The man said, "no, sir, I have not." There happened to be a river close by so the preacher caught him by the neck and pushed him under the water and kept him down for 15 seconds. When he brought him up, he said, "did you see Jesus?" the man said "no sir, I did not." So the preacher put his head back down in the water - this time for 30 seconds. When he pulled him up again, he asked, "did you see Jesus?" The man said, "no sir, I did not." His ability to bring fresh light to the experience permits personal self-discovery. And over the past century Ireland's conscious self-awareness has helped it discover new roles of leadership in Europe. The Irish are trusted and admired by their European colleagues who relish their work ethic and humor. And the smooth creamy flavor of Dublin brewed Guinness. The Irish have brought reason and intelligence with them to pan-European projects and peace keeping around the globe. They offer alternatives to the judgments and grudges of the past.

The grandeur of Yeats' poetic intuition is a feast of civility. Long traditions enjoyed by the Bronze Age Celts whose nobility and wisdom walked before them.

So the centennial year of Yeats' Nobel Prize for Literature is worth our collaborative celebration. Worth the measure of our willingness to embrace our Irish cultural identity to mirror the ancient ones, the superhuman De Dannin or the"The Wanderings of Oisin" based as it is on the lyrics of the Fenian Cycle of Irish mythology. Bringing all of us to a worthy, holy Christmas.







HE CHRISTMAS SEASON IN Ireland is a glorious time of the year, and a perfect ime to visit. Put simply, Ireland loes Christmas better than nywhere else I have ever been. t helps that most Irish people njoy a full two week vacation, tarting before Christmas Eve nd ending a day or two after Jew Year's Day. So there is an lmost ubiquitous sense of boniomie throughout town and ountry and people are even nore relaxed and fun-seeking han usual.

All the major towns and ities across the island are ransformed for the better part f December. Downtown areas re festooned with fabulous ight displays—Grafton Street n Dublin and Victoria Square n Belfast are particularly fine xamples. In recent years a iew Christmas tradition has merged on Grafton Street, elebrity busking. The area vell known for the quality of ts buskers, some of which have ideos on social media with iews numbering in the milions—plays host on Christmas ve to some of Ireland's bigest musical talents, all in an ffort to raise money for worthy auses. Recent performers nclude Bono, Glen Hansard, Iozier, Damien Rice, Imelda 1/ay, Damien Dempsey, and he band Kodaline. Its free and pen to all, just remember to ut a few euro in the bucket at he front!

Music is also a big part of Christmas in traditional Irish ubs. Fairy lights, crackling fires nd creamy pints are perfect cene-setters for a 'trad session,' where local musicians gather to lay Irish music, unplugged and ften impromptu. And there re plenty of other treats to be ound in pubs this time of year. ry a whiskey punch or an Irish offee. According to Esquire nagazine, "There are few drinks s instantly delightful as hot rish whiskey punch." Made vith whiskey, lemon, cloves

and a touch of brown sugar (if you need it), it warms you up from the inside out. And there is nothing like the scent of cloves to get you in the Christmas mood.

Perhaps the most iconic features of Christmas in Ireland are its fabulous Christmas Markets. These markets epitomize the 'Céad Míle Fáilte (hundred thousand welcomes)' spirit for which Ireland is famous, and they are the perfect places to stock up on holiday goodies, find the perfect gift, or take the kids for a sleigh ride or a visit to Santa. The Belfast Continental Christmas Market outside Belfast City Hall, the Dublin Castle Christmas Market, the Galway Continental Christmas Market in Eyre Square and the Waterford Winterval Christmas Market in Waterford City are all fine examples.

Nothing symbolizes the uniqueness of an Irish Christmas more than the tradition of 'The Christmas Swim.' All around the island of Ireland on Christmas morning, thousands of brave and hardy souls make their way down to the coast and hurl themselves into the icy cold sea. Naturally, this causes plenty of amusement among the fleece-wrapped onlookers, but it has become one of the island's biggest traditions, with many of the swimmers participating to raise money for charity. Irish journalist Fergal Keane once said of his Christmas swim: "It was worth every second of Arctic misery for the sense of achievement that followed."

New Year's Festival Dublin is the biggest celebration across the island in December. A great way to ring in 2024 it will be filled with fantastic music and dazzling light shows. The festival is held over four fun-filled days, with events taking place across the city. Iconic attractions like the Guinness Storehouse, Trinity College Dublin and EPIC—The Irish Emigration Museum are illuminated with fabulous light displays. Highlights include two spectacular midnight moment countdown events on New Year's Eve—a family-friendly matinee performance and an evening event at Dublin Castle.

#### Planning for early 2024?

There are plenty of good reasons to visit Ireland in the early months of the year too, even though they are generally considered 'off-season.' 

The strike had lasted nearly 120 days and saw the Writers' Guild of America going back to work just a couple of weeks ago, and so this is good news for the industry, though the aftereffects will be felt for a while.

The SAG-AFTRA deal sees improved benefits, greater streaming royalties and an as yet not fully-explained agreement on the limits on the use of AI (which is already happening in the acting world).

The agreement is only for three years though, and I wonder by then if we'll be seeing classic Irish actors like Maureen O'Hara, Peter O'Toole and Richard Harris coming back on screen? I suspect not, but who knows?

Either way, with the Holidays now upon us, it's unlikely that movies and even some television will really get back fully into production until the new year. So, things are still pretty quiet here in Hollywood, though Irish movies are still out there - and winning awards.

The Deepest Breath, directed by Laura McGann and produced by Jamie D'Alton and available to watch now on Netflix, just won two gongs at the Critics' Choice Awards: Best Sports

Documentary and Best Cinematography. It follows free-diving champion Alessia

Zecchini and expert safety diver Stephen Keenan, their meeting at the pinnacle of the free-diving world, and experiences of the extreme sports' rewards and risks - it's fascinating, nervetingling stuff, so give it a watch.

Also, though the Oscars are many months away, there's good news for Belfast-based production company Cyprus Avenue Films, which has had their documentary In the Shadow of Beirut selected as Ireland's entry for Best International Film.

Already a winner of Best International Film at the Doc Edge Festival in New Zealand, it's

directed by Stephen Gerard Kelly and Garry Keane, and Executive Produced by a couple of famous names we don't often associate with the movie world: Hillary Rodham Clinton and Chelsea Clinton.

In The Shadow of Beirut is a searing portrait of four families struggling to survive in two impoverished

neighborhoods during an evolving economic crisis and the recent global pandemic.

Tough viewing perhaps, though producer Brendan J. Byrne noted that "it's both a relief and a huge reward that after all the hard work and dedication by a huge number of talented people who are passionate about their art, these works are being recognized at the highest level on the

The story is based around an international heist crew, led by Cyrus Whitaker (Hart), who are in a race to steal \$100 million in gold - and not from a bank, but from a 777-airplane flying at 40,000 feet.

Station, and Ardglass Harbour.

Finally, Irish-American actress Saoirse Ronan (who is now 29, which is hard to believe, even if she has been making movies for years already), has joined the cast of Bad Apples, a new movie that has been described as a "biting satirical comedy with thriller elements."

Ronan will play Maria, a primary school teacher doing her best to inspire a class of 10-year-olds, but unable to succeed because of one unruly

and chaotic student. With her career in question and the child's behavior getting more and more out of control spiraling, she makes a series of bad decisions that lead to her accidentally taking and locking this "bad apple" in her home.

Maria tries to backtrack what has happened, but when she finds that the students are flourishing and the staff and parents are thrilled with the improvements, she finds herself in a very difficult place about what to do next...

It sounds like an interesting idea, that's for sure, and the adaptation of Rasmus Lindgren's debut novel De Oönskade will be by screenwriter Jess O'Kane, and filming is due to start in fall next year, so we probably won't see in until 2025.

That's such a long way off - or so it seems - but of course we're already at the end of 2023, so Happy Holidays and a Healthy and Prosperous New Year to you all.
